

The American Experience by Doug Jones.

W.H.K.F. visit to W.S.I.K.F.

About a year ago it was thought that it would be a good idea to go to Longbeach for the Kite Festival. After a lot of muttering about affording it, four of us were

positive about going.

So on the 17th of August 1991 Janet and Dave Robinson, Martin Croxton and Myself, Doug Jones arrived three and a half hours early for flight BA 84 to seattle to be told the Germans had already put their towels on the window seats. The flight was uneventful, landing at Vancouver some 10 hours later where all the Germans got out and so we had window seats to watch the refuelling and for the 20 minute flight on to Seattle. During this time I could not help but reflect, I suppose when we come back to Canada all the best places would have been reserved by the Germans.

Arriving at Seattle we had to decide who was going to rob us first; the luggage

porter or the the car hire company, as it turned out it was a draw.

We then set out for a Mc.Donalds to decide on our plan of action, having phoned Doug and Jody Hagaman and decided to go for Westport. On arrival we discovered that there was no motel available and so Dave, Janet and Martin found themselves sleeping in an R.V. (mobile home) I was on Doug and Jody's sofa.

The next day we were recovering from the day before with a look around Westport and anap in the afternoon in the motel. Later in the afternoon we went to see Doug

Hagaman completing Daves parafoil.

Watching Doug making kites make one realise that everyone else I know who makes kites suffer from impatience. Doug will stitch 10 inches then inspect his work, I am sure he counts every stitch.

In the evening it was partytime at Doug and Jody's along with several of the Westport Kite fraternity. On the Monday it was finally off to Longbeach via the Pacific County Court and an Indian Reservation. To be honest an Indian Reservation looks no different except that there are a few Red Indian children and you see a shop proclaiming, "Chief Charlies Fireworks and Video Shop". The landscape was reminiscent of Scotland with a lot more trees. The Pacific County Court was an impressive building having been built because a bunch of ner do goods hijacked the old court in the wild and woolly west days.

On arrival at Longbeach we booked into The Souwester the 5 star establishment of the Pacific Northwest Coast, the colour of the stars need not be discussed. Suffice to say that when you told someone you got a knowing smile. Martin declared that the place was suffering from dry rot, he is a builder and should know. The next day it was serious kite flying at least for Martin and myself. for Janet and Dave it was serious pin trading. For the rest of the days of the festival it was the same pattern generally speaking though it was rumoured that Dave did fly a facet on occassions.

On the Wednesday we all went on a trip along the banks of the Columbia River. to show how big the river is, at Astoria the bridge is over 5 miles long, when we crossed there was a ship tied up at Astoria it looked deminutive, later I found out it was the fifth largest ship in the World. We travelled as far as the Bonnerville Dam a distance as far as the length of the River Severn except the river is still over a mile wide. The scenery was fantastic, things we saw included:-Eagles, Mt. Hood Mt. St. Helens, Foxes, the Columbia Gorge, Portland and Waterfalls.

Next day was kite flying again and it is worth mentioning some of the characters at the festival. There were two men , one dressed up as Benjamin Franklin the other as Samuel Cody, I could not help wondering why no one was dressed as Alexander Graham Bell at least it would have given a lady a chance to dress up as his wife.

The kites varied a lot, single line kites were well separated from the stunters, then of course there was Superman who was separated even further away. Superman is a Thai star who will turn up at various kiting events through-out the World free gratis and for nothing. His kite is a Cobra measuring 1 kilometre. (ideas not be mentioned at next kite festival organising meeting).

Mr. Marouka a Japanese kite flyer of some considerable note the World over who borrowed my kite to take some aerial photographs. He said or I think he said it was because it was the the steadiest suitable kite at the festival for the job, well

thats what made it for.

There was a Royal Thai Kite Team there in thier official uniforms. It seems that the King of Thailand has an official team of kite flyers. Australians were represented by a man from Tasmania with a Sutton Flowform(sorry I have forgotten his name) The Canadians were very well represented, they were flying numerous kites, one represented all the provinces plus the 2 territories, another flew some giant variants of Sutton Flowforms. The British were there to a chap from Yeovil, not sure what he was flying. I almost forgot there were 4 from W.H.K.F. flying various legs kites, parafoils and rokakus.

The rokaku fight need not be mentioned because we were disqualifed, the politest thoughts at the time was "it was a fix". Come to think of it the thought still lingers. At the end of the festival Doug Hagaman flew a black parafoil while a speech

was given in memory of Donima Jalbert who had recently died.

The kite festival being over we made our way back to Westport where after going on a crabbing expedition with Larry and Ian, we said fairwells to Doug and Jody Hagaman. We then made our way up through the Olympic National Forest, 200 miles of wall to wall trees, mountains and lakes to Port Angeles for the ferry to Vancouver Island. There is a kite shop in Victoria quite a small one, but very high quality stock. We spent the morning in Victoria before setting out for Duncan which is said to be a Native Heritage Centre, could be said to be a good sales ploy. I found it very interesting though the others were not so satisfied.

After Vancouver Island it was back to Seattle via the outskirts of Vancouver. Seattle is a place I would like to get to know better, 2 excellent kite shops, Thousands of kites in each shop. We went up the space neddle, travelled on a monorail, had an extremely interesting trip around in a taxi for \$ 10. The taxi driver was one of the nicest people you could have ever wished to meet. After Seattle it was back to England with very good seats on the aircraft thanks to a friend of

mine but thats another story.

I am afraid the chronical is a bit skimpy but if I mentioned everything it would need about 100 pages, the things I will not forget are the friendliness of the people over there especially Doug and Jody, Larry and Ian and also Al and Creda Axon.

COWPAT HILL - The WHKF Journal Kite Flying Safety Tips

- The NEVER'S Of Kite Flying
- Fly a kite in wet or stormy weather, try to keep your kite line dry.
- Fly a kite near power lines, transmission towers or aerials.
- Fly a kite with wire or anything metallic in the line.
- Fly a strong-pulling kite without wearing GLOVES.
- Leave odd bits of flying line etc on the flying site.
- Fly a kite at over 200 feet*.
- *Kite Festivals may have C.A.A. clearance to fly higher... ASK!

- The Things To AVOID
- Motorways, roads, car parks, railway lines or buildings.
- Airfields and low flying air traffic patterns.
- Members of the public... stunt flyers, please take care!
- Those kite-eating trees.
- Animals, they can be frighted by kites
- Remember...your kite can get really quite lonely up high in the sky, just occasionally, look up and give them a little SMILE...
- ...AND PLEASE, MIND THOSE POWER LINES!

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
