Alan and I had talked about the workshop, but decided that our sewing skills (that's a laugh) would not be up to an intense workshop. (sticking is OK but sewing in a workshop!!!!! HEEELLP)I explained this to Marla to which she replied "Alan's coming, I've just spoken to him "(what happened to solidarity) now I'm on my own against Marla, what do I do? "I'll have to think about it". Marla replies "I'll ring you tomorrow"Resigned myself to the fact that I'm going to the workshop, thinking New Year, new challenge, be brave.

On speaking to Alan we both decided that we needed some training ahead of workshop, it's been about 5 Years since I used a sewing machine and I would probably require a whole week to make a Ralf Maserski BoxTower 3, not 2 days. It was decided that we ask Helen Howes of Raindrop Kites for some training in basic sewing machine, and what a great day we had at her workshop. Alan and I had to work hard, but with Helen's expert tutelage we both went home with kites to be proud of. Thanks Helen, for all your help that day, I know we all had to work very hard. It's amazing how quickly February 12th came around. 6 am we're off to Swindon, we joked as to whether we would get lost in Swindon again, we did. (3 times over the weekend) Arriving early at Penhill Primary school, we said our hello's to WHKF's and the other workshop participants, picked our tables and set up our machines.(as if we knew what we were doing) Ralf Maserski was setting up some sewing machines, time to have a look at Ralf's kites especially the BoxTower 3. Looking at the black edging on this kite I was terrified, (thanks Marla another fine mess you've got me into) I can't put an edge like that on a kite that takes a lot of experience, which I sadly lack. Eventually Dave Introduces everyone to Ralf and the workshop was under way, we chose our kite colours and picked up our workshop manuals, this was going to prove to be very useful, well planned with pictures and very simple instructions. Mine was well thumbed by the end of the workshop. Having sorted out our materials the first job was to put the black edging on one of the kite panels. The next step was a revelation, Ralf pointed us to the machines he had been setting up when we arrived and we where introduced to Suisiei, an incredible attachment for double folding 25mm wide rip stop tape. Simply feed your sail panel into the fold of rip stop tape on the Suisei and sew. Professional edges in minutes. Needless to say everyone was very excited and I realised even I could make this kite. (I could make it; whether it looked professional we would see) Ralf said that all kite shops in Germany sell the 25mm wide ripstop tape, it comes in colours too.

As I suspected this workshop was a lot of hard work, but with guidance from Ralf, the help from everyone else at the workshop and of course the excellent WHKF lunch, I managed to get my kite to the point where I could finish on Sunday. Maybe if I had referred to my manual and treble checked what I was doing, I would not have made so many mistakes, which required unpicking. But I think everyone agreed, that after the Suisei, the most important tool was the unpicking tool. We all met up later at the Blunsdon House Hotel for a drink, a superb carver dinner WELL DONE WHKF's. This was an opportunity to relax and to talk to Ralf. He told us of a German web site that stocks 25mm wide ripstop in all sorts of colours.

Alan and I managed to get lost again on our way back to our guest house, it's Swindon what do you expect. Sunday morning after a good breakfast back to School and nearly everyone managed to finish their kites by lunchtime, I even managed to fly mine in the playground. White Horse Kite Flyers Workshop

I happened to bump into Ron dell at a computer course I was on in welwyn and he asked if I would be interested in going on a kite workshop with the WHKF, I said I have not done one before but I would think about it.

The kite to be made was a flat kite with a 3D effect designed by **Ralf Maserski**. A little while later I decided to give one of the members a ring Dave Robinson he told me more about it, all sounded very good so I went a head and booked a place and sent my deposit in.

Firstly before going away Barbara and I had to sort out an evening with Tony Rook as our guild speaker for the evening. He has done many talks on Archaeology and written several books, last year he was on television doing one of his digs in Turkey with Tony Robinson (he seems to pop up everywhere) and the lovely Kim Wilde. He gave a slide show showing many slides of the work he's covered; Roman baths, Various digs with articles found such as Roman vases, tools, and figurines some of which are now in the London History and science museum, one slide showed the front page (local boy finds...) of Tony in his local Kent newspaper when he was only 16.

GOKF may remember in 2004 doing a kite workshop at fine Georgian building which is now sherrards wood girls school, Tony was digging up their football pitch at weekends in the early 60's and finding roman articles. This is also a stones throw from the Welwyn roman bath-house that he discovered built 1,700 years ago, ingeniously preserved in a vault under the A1 {M} The head master could see that he had tremendous knowledge on Archaeology that he offered Tony a job to teach at the school, which he did for 8 years.

After the talk and slides he had a display of his books on the table .I bought a book called 'roads' one section in the book mentions the volume of the traffic on one of the local roads in 1808 it goes to say'waggons with five horse or more6, 158'

'Carts with two horses or less 10,784' At the end of the evening all members thanked Tony for coming along and giving a splendid talk and slide show.

Tony autographed some books before he went home and he signed a piece of paper for me, he said 'that's ok as long as you don't stick this to a letter saying <u>I Tony rook owe Stephen Hodges the sum of forty thousand pounds.</u>

Another good book he has written is called 'the Labrador trust' I gave his wife Merie a small gift of chocolates for bringing him a long.

Friday February 11th I was on the M25 heading for Swindon, I couldn't have picked a worse time to go, Barbara had broken a bone in her foot earlier this week, I was late home from work, strong wind, rain, traffic moving at 20 mph I arrived at 10pm and defiantly ready for bed.

After a good breakfast and a chat to two other kite flyers that were staying in the same guesthouse, I was off to Penhill where the workshop was to be held. There I met up with David Robinson and Arthur the chairman of the WHKF, who I have seen at many festivals with parachuting teddy bears. Many other people with their sewing machines were getting set-up on the tables. Ralf Maserski first showed us what we was going to make this weekend, A Box tower 3 and explained how we where going to tackle it. We had a book each to follow from and then chose which colours to work from, we all started ok. Later in the day I found I had made a mistake others did as well, there was some unpicking to be done. A brilliant attachment Ralf had brought over from Germany was a fitting to screw to the sewing machine footplate, 25mm ripstop was fed in and turned over as you sewed wrapping itself around the edge of the kite material, everyone was fascinated by how it worked, we got the best results with it fitted on a Pfaff machine that had a built in walking foot.

A very impressive kite Ralf has made in the past is a flatbox seven, 8 light blue/purple squares with 4 red/orange squares poking in the middle, in the sky its got brilliant 3d effect but the whole kite is flat!

After coffee I used a singer machine that had this attachment on and no walking foot, but with many problems. Over the day many people took photographs at different stages. A break for lunch with large helpings of tomato pasta and French bread that was made up by the female members of the WHKF, they did a marvelous job. Raffle tickets were being sold for tomorrow. In the afternoon Phillipa Todd had completely finished her box tower!

At 5pm we switched off all machines for the day. We were all then to meet at 7pm for dinner at The Blunsdon House Hotel. All kite makers met at the bar for a drink and then drifted off into the carvery, after the starter Ralf assembled a large box tower kite, which he displayed against a pillar. The main dinner and pudding were very good: Dave Robinson sat at a chair that had a happy birthday balloon on it," Many happy returns Dave" We left there at 10.45 and got back for some sleep and looked forward to the next morning.

Sunday morning 9.15am we sorted ourselves out and switched our machines on and got off to a good start with everyone looking forward to finishing their kite today. Many people came up against small problems, angle of ripstop, sewing, knots, but everyone helped each other to sort things out. Tea, coffee and biscuits were in the kitchen all day for people to help themselves, after some sewing with my Bernina I noticed Ron Dell had popped in to see us all and have a chat to many WHKF members. By Midday quite a few people were putting the bridle on their finished kite. Lunch time shepherds pie followed by bread and butter pudding, then Dave Robinson gave a speech, thanking several members for helping to put the workshop on (not forgetting the caretaker) and especially Ralf for coming over from Germany and spoke about details of forthcoming events, maybe another workshop in October with Robert Brassington. The raffle was drawn with 30 prizes; Alan Outram had a winning ticket and won a pink jumper, a WHKF member said' come on Alan try it on' he posed and photos were quickly taken, Ron won several prizes, the best prize was a


large Box Tower Kite very neatly made by Ralf Maserski which Alan also won. The raffle made £175. Back in the workshop more kites were completed, each kitemaker was given a pin from Ralf in matching colours: some flew their kites outside immediately with good results.

All 14 people doing the workshop had completed their kite by 2.15pm. Ralf had 3 more kite kits that were sold. Several kite makers and WHKF helped to put away the tables and chairs, and that was it, a very interesting weekend. Keith Boxall and Alan Outram couldn't wait to fly theirs, so they stopped off on the way home at Epsom Downs and flew both together, taking some great photos, well done.

I look forward to flying my box towerv3 at Ferry Meadows and Weymouth.... I hope it fly's well.

Three Festivals and Swindon?

It has only been over the last couple of years that I have been going to overseas kite festivals. I have been to Three:- Lunen, Fano and Dieppe. Don't worry I am not going to give you a blow-by-blow account of them. When I think back over them their diversity gives me great pleasure in our hobby.

Lunen is a huge grass site where you see incredible hi-tec kites and equipment and can spend hours buying beautifully engineered swivels etc. Even ground anchors are superbly made and all we do is hit them with hammers and try to bend them by hanging ever-larger kites on them.

Fano is a beach festival and you go there to fly kites or marvel at other people's displays and wonder at the huge area filled with an unbelievable numbers of kites. There are no trade stands and there's plenty of room for the biggest kites and buggies have their own space (about 5km of it).

Dieppe is staged on a grass sea front and extends onto a stony beach as the space fills up. This festival is all about people, with individual tents provided for any country that wants to display. Again no trade stands except one down a street the far side of the event, but he does sell very well priced lines. Kites tend not to be as big as the other events but as they are less spread out and it is easier for the public to get close from all sides, you get a fantastic display of a multitude of different kite forms and patterns.

Getting to each festival is also very different; to Lunen it's through the chunnel and a very long drive, Fano it's a long ferry from the east coast (not much fun if you are a poor sailor) and Dieppe is south coast and shortish ferry trip.

Food in Lunen is supplied and excellent, Fano you self cater and in Dieppe it's just got to be excellent French restaurants. Accommodation in Lunen is on the floor of a gymnasium with a mat if you get there early, Fano self-catering apartments and Dieppe is hotels along the sea front.

Even the weather varies Lunen in October was very cold with frost but bright, Fano in June was overcast with 20mph winds that made it feel cold and Dieppe in September, mild and occasionally wet.

Then of course there is Swindon: brilliant grassy site, good selection of trade stands, food has to be chips with and accommodation in campsite or hotel a few miles away. Travel is easy and I will not comment on the weather. Plus we have the Science Museum exhibits open.

So how do we rate? I am proud to be able to compare our festival with these others and think we do very well. It says a great deal about the early work put in by the clubs founder members and the hard work put in by current members. This year it's a free event so please come along and help us make the 2005 festival a memorable one.

Cinnamon Crisps

The NEVERS of Kite Flying

- Fly a kite in wet or stormy weather, try to keep your kite line dry.
- Fly a kite near power lines, transmission towers or
- Fly a kite with wire or anything metallic in the
- Fly a strong pulling kite without wearing
- Leave odd bits of flying line etc on the flying site.
- Fly a kite at over 200 feet*.
- *Kite festivals may have C.A.A. clearance to fly higher.....ASK!

The Things to AVOID

- · Motorways, roads, car parks railway lines or buildings.
- Airfields and low flying air traffic patterns.
- Members of the public....stunt flyers please take
- Those kite eating trees.
- Animals, they can be frightened by kites. Remember...your kites can get really quite lonely up high in the sky, just occasionally, look up and give them a little SMILE.
