

KAPital Centenary

2010 sees the centenary of the Guiding movement and the units were set the challenge to celebrate the occasion in an interesting way. My wife is a Guide leader. She came up with the idea that the girls, Rainbows, Brownies and Guides could stand in the figure "100" and have their picture taken from above. You could take the picture from a high building or you could hire a mechanical platform or talk nicely to the local fire brigade about using one of their ladders. No good. Problems with location, finances and Health & Safety. So, kites are the answer. That's where I came in.

My KAP rig is very basic and unreliable so it is very hit and miss as to whether you get any picture and usually not what you are hoping for so I called on the experience of John Browning. His rig has a video downlink so that you can see what you are taking. This is a great advantage. Having got John's agreement, we said yes and the Valley Division Guides started their organising.

Theale Green School was the place. Sunday 21st February. We were having some very wet weather this spring but ever the optimists, we turned out at 11:30 that morning.

The overnight rain had stopped so we put on boots and went on to the playing field where we put up a kite to check the wind direction and then advised the ladies where we would want the girls to stand.

They had previously got the girls to stand in groups to see how big the "100" should be. Armed with this information they marked out the "100" with string and tent pegs. No one seemed impressed with my rendition of "You'll never go to heaven with a fat girl guide" though.

No rain when we retired to a local hostelry for lunch but then it started to pour. Nothing to do except get on with lunch. However, when we came out the rain had stopped and it was looking a bit brighter. Back to the field.

It is about 1:30 and the girls are due at 2:00 so I launch a 12ft mega-delta. Looks good, plenty of lift and still in about the right place. 1:45 and the wind starts to drop. Quickly back to the car for a second delta and I stack it 50ft above the first one. We now have plenty of lift. Relief! Dead on time, a seemingly endless stream of girls approaches and they start to get marshalled to their positions. Why don't they fit? Why have more than 350 girls turned up? It's the age old story "There's a camera about so we might get in the paper" and so everyone turns out. John puts the camera on the line and it's all systems go. The weather has cheered up and it is now quite bright and as usual with KAP you take as many pictures as possible. So it's "Arthur go left, no right, up a bit back, down, can't you hold that kite steady etc.etc.etc." This goes on for about 30minutes until John thinks he may have something and the girls are allowed to file back to somewhere warmer.

The rest of us have very little idea of what we have achieved and so we pack up and go home to wait. I don't think John can have moved from his computer over the next 36 hours and his copy of Photoshop must be virtually worn out but he has got 5 pictures that he has stitched and doctored to his satisfaction. They are very

much better than anything the Guides had expected. So now it's articles for the local paper, the national Guiding press and last but not least, Cowpat!

We learnt a number of things from this exercise or perhaps confirmed what we already knew:


Good preparation pays off.


Newbie sports kite flier confessions 7 – Stalls, front flips, and perhaps axels

For this article I was wanting to talk about how my partner and I learnt to axel, which was the first trick that I learned, and which I can do really well. But I must confess that I made many attempts and false starts to writing about axeling, as the story has many interdependent themes. What should I write about first?

In the end I thought I had better start at the beginning, with the part I learnt first.

The last three articles were about back flips – where from normal flying, in response to suddenly releasing the lines, the nose flips backwards. This article is about a way of getting the bottom of the kite to move backwards, so that the nose falls towards the flyer. This position is called the front flip.

To show how this works, take an assembled 2-line sport kite and hold it in your hands at the angle it is in normal upwards flying. Then let go of it. You will find that as it falls, the bottom of the kite slips backwards, and the nose drops down, as shown in the diagram below.



Stalling into a front flip

The diagrams show how the kite falls backwards when the lines are released. The distances between the normal flight and front flip positions vary with the kite. For the kite outline shown (a Carl Robertshaw Fury) the distances are exaggerated in order to space out the kite drawings and labels.

The same thing can happen when the kite is flying at the end of the lines. Go out on a day when the wind is just enough to fly the kite. When the kite is near the ground and flying upwards move the arms towards the kite and walk forward to release the tension on the lines. The release of tension is not sudden as with the backflip, but a little more gradual. So if the nose starts to fall backwards then try releasing the tension more gradually. When the kite stops flying in whatever direction to nose is pointing in (upwards here), it is "stalled". The kite then starts to fall down and away from the flyer, with the nose dropping down so that the kite is lying front down.

If you have got your kite into a front flip and are as lucky as me, then every time tug on one line, and the kite will rotate about a vertical axis with its front remaining downwards. This is called an "axel", after the ballet spin of the same name. Somehow I could do this naturally from the very first few months of flying.

However if you are as unlucky as my partner, then every time you tug on one line while the kite is in the front flip, the kite will start to rotate but then tangle with the lines. Quite why this happens and how my partner finally learnt a different way to axel should be the subjects of some future articles. In the next article I'll try to explain about the properties of the "wind window", which can help you to stall and axel the kite even when the wind is up.

$T_{ips} \ A_{nd} \ T_{ricks}$

Mushroom caps as described in the last edition of "Cowpat Hill" are a really effective method of preventing carbon fibre tube from cutting through end pockets. However for those of us who lack access to the specialist plastics and skills required to make mushroom caps, there is another method for covering carbon fibre tube ends, which requires only PVC electrical tape and some scissors. This method was recommended by Jim Barber of Team Cutting Edge (the team who won the world sport kite championship twice in the mid-noughties), and is said to be longer lasting than conventional (hollow) end caps, as carbon fibre tube can eventually push through the end of a conventional end cap.

Take a length of electrical tape and wrap it 2 to 3 times around the end of the tube, leaving around 5 - 7mm protruding beyond the tube. With the point of the scissors, push and tuck the protruding tape into the inside the tube.

The technique appears to work because it covers and so blunts the otherwise hard and sharp edges of the tube end.

The tape covering is so slim that usually stoppers and elbows can be slid over the spar end. (So far we have always been able to slide the fittings over a taped spar end, and haven't yet had a taped spar cut through the end pocket.)


PVC electrical tape is also excellent for fixing nocks to the end of spars. If the nock fits too loosely over the spar end, the spar end can be thickened by wrapping electrical tape around it. After the nock is fitted over the spar end, the nock can be secured by wrapping tape around spar and nock 2 or 3 times.

An advantage of this technique is that it is easy to remove the nock and save it for reuse if the spar is damaged. - Just unwrap the tape and pull off the nock.

PVC electrical tape is good for making stoppers. - A stopper is for stopping a fitting such as an elbow from sliding along a spar. Commercial kites use as stoppers: C clips - C shaped plastic that clip around the spar, end caps with the ends cut off and spit so that they can be glued onto the spar, or heat-shrink tubing. All these are quick to fit. But often the sail pockets/sleeves are too tight to allow C clips to slide through, and stoppers made from end caps often come off, usually as a result of their edges catching against fabric when a spar is threaded through the sail sleeve. Heat shrink requires the correct size of heat shrink tubing and either a heat gun or care when applying heat with a match.

In contrast a stopper made from PVC electrical tape can easily slide through a sleeve, and requires less skill than heat-shrink tubing. To make a stopper, simply wrap the electrical tape around the spar enough times to build up the required diameter. What is the required diameter? - I usually measure this from the stopper on the spar that I am replacing, or if replacing one of those end cap adapted stoppers that has fallen off, wrap around enough tape to make up the thickness of the end cap's walls.

My Flare Kite



Ages ago, I made a flare kite using Wolfgang Schimmelpfennig's plans. Made in ripstop with Ramin dowel, the kite is a superb low-wind kite. If you give it a long launch, then you can often get the kite up into a breeze where it will pull like a train. Often I have stood holding my "No Wind" kite in a dead calm with the smoke from my pipe going straight up and the string pulling like anything. For a first-thing-in-the-morning kite, it is wonderful for catching that first light breeze. I needed a low-wind lifter for KAP. I nearly went for a Fled but decided that, because there is no bridle adjustment on a Fled (such adjustment can be useful when carrying a camera rig), I would build a bigger and more robust Schimmelpfennig Flare. Ripstop again but carbon fibre tube in place of Ramin dowel.

I have yet to fly my new kite but if it behaves like my original smaller one, I shall be well pleased.

Out of interest, I weighed my new kite and compared it with the original.

Original Kite

Height: 100cm. Sail area: 0.96m² Weight: 140g. Weight/Area: 145.8g/m²

New Kite

Height: 150cm. Sail area: 2.16m² Weight: 270g. Weight/Area: 125.0g/m²

I suppose I have just re-discovered a basic principal. Increase size of kite and you get a more efficient one.

Polly's Pantry

A recipe passed on to me from our daughter Emma. It is a very quick recipe to do but very tasty - lovely for a "Summer Supper"!

Ingredients.
500grms Pasta
1 onion
4 or 5 slices of bacon
1 packet mozzarella cheese
Red pesto
Rocket
A little oil
Salad
Garlic bread.

Bacon / Mozzarella Pasta

Serves 4 People

Put 500 gram of Pasta on to cook.

Dice one onion and dice 4 or 5 slices of bacon, fry together in a little oil.

Drain pasta when cooked and into the pasta pan put the fried onion and bacon and mix with the pasta with the onion and bacon.

To this add a packet of mozzarella cheese, about 2 or 3 desert spoons of red pesto (or to taste). Then add several pieces of rocket and mix well while over the heat for a few minutes until all combined.

Serve immediately with garlic bread and salad.

Ed's note:

This sounds lovely and as it is so quick it will be great when you get home after a day's flying. I shall certainly be trying it but will almost certainly add some garlic and chilli at the first stage and add some olives to the accompaniments.

Knowing where this recipe comes from I don't understand the fact that no red wine is mentioned. I would recommend a good Chianti Classico.

When I get mozzarella it comes as a big lump floating in liquid so I assume it should be drained and diced???

Personal liability insurance

At the last AGM we discussed the club membership and the fact that it is in decline, one of the suggestions for this came from a member who said that they had family members who weren't renewing because they thought they were covered for insurance when they were out flying on their own, I pointed out that that had never been the case. At the first committee meeting after the AGM we discussed whether our insurers Zurich would cover our members on a personal basis. After some long discussions with Zurich and many emails going back and forth, I think we have come up with an excellent addition to the club liability insurance, below is the addition that I have cut & pasted from their recent message to me.

Quotation

Policy extension for registered individual members to hold Public Liability for the following activities:

solo kite flying including "parachuting" of soft toys anywhere in the UK,

solo kite flying whilst attending any other kiting club activity anywhere worldwide,

solo kite flying whilst competing anywhere worldwide whilst representing the White Horse Kite Flyers, also member to member cover.

Annual charge per participating member will be £9.00 inclusive of IPT, subject to a minimum policy charge of £261.00 (inc IPT)

White Horse Kite Flyers group to maintain a register of members and declare the number on an annual basis at each renewal.

Members must be UK residents any member under 16 must be accompanied by a supervising adult whilst flying for the cover to operate

All other terms and conditions as per the Insight Policy Wording.

The Committee is very happy with this addition for our members and recommend it, however it is an optional insurance, you do not *have* to take it; if you feel you don't need it. It is a personal insurance policy so if for instance a Man & Wife want the insurance you'll both have to pay the additional fee. You cannot take this insurance on its own, you have to be a paid up WHKF member. We intend to launch this at the Festival in May; the start date will be June 1st so that the renewal of this will not clash with the club membership renewal; which is at the AGM in November. However if a new member joins the club in, say, February they will have to pay the full fee, which will still be renewable in June. There is *no* part-year fee!

Festival in Malmesbury

Malmesbury Town Council, in association with Air Attractions are pleased to announce the forthcoming Malmesbury "Eilmer 1000" Kite Festival.

1000 years ago this year Eilmer, a monk at Malmesbury Abbey made himself wings and leapt from the Abbey tower. Contemporary records relate that he flew for more than a furlong (200 yds), thus making him one of the world's first aviators.

Unfortunately he broke his ankles on landing due to "the violence of the wind and consciousness of his own rashness" (ground turbulence - a problem well known to kite flyers!). Accounts show that he understood afterwards that the reason for the crash was the failure to add an effective tail. So whilst his claim to the first flight is sometimes disputed, he was surely the world's first true test pilot! Unfortunately, he was never able test out this theory as the venture left him lame and the Abbott forbade him to make any further attempts.

In celebration of the event, Malmesbury is holding a number of flight related events throughout the year, but the centrepiece of these is a kite festival to be held on 31st July/1st August at the "Worthies" in Malmesbury, SN16 9JX.

We have already secured the services of some of Britain's top flyers plus the "Sky Fliers" display team from the Netherlands.

We would welcome other kite flyers to add to the spectacle.

WHITE HORSE KITE FLYERS CODE OF PRACTICE

Always fly safely.

Always be considerate to other people using the same area whether it is noise or physical intrusion into their space.

Always fly legally taking in to account all national, local and CAA restrictions and by-laws.

Never fly at a height of more than 60m above ground level, in the UK unless a CAA clearance is in force (as at kite festivals). If you don't know what the clearance is ASK!

Never fly a kite in wet or stormy weather. Always try and keep your line dry.

Never fly a kite near power lines, transmission towers or aerials.

Never fly near Motorways, roads, car parks or railways.

Never fly near airfields.

Never fly a kite with anything metallic in the line.

When tethering a kite ensure that the ground anchor is suitable (see BKFA report 6 June 06).

When flying large kites always use a brake line.

Always wear good quality gloves when flying large powerful kites.

Always give priority to domestic animals particularly if they are showing signs of distress.

Always clear up after yourself, especially lines, tails and bits of plastic that could trap, choke or injure domestic or wild animals.

Never fly near those kite-eating trees.

Finally remember.....your kites can get really quite lonely up high in the sky; just occasionally, look up and give them a SMILE. It will make you feel better too.
