

Six dead after throats slashed by glass-coated kite strings.

Six people bled to death after their throats were slit by glass-coated kite strings used in competitions.

The victims, including children aged two, three and seven, died at the Uttarayan kite festival in the Western Indian state of Gujarat.

The strings are razor-sharp because they are coated with powdered glass, and because they are made of plastic they do not break easily. All victims bled to death after being cut.

In separate incidents at the festival, where 200 people were injured, two children died after scooters on which they were riding with their parents hit strings that had been cut during the competition and were left dangling from trees and buildings. The third child was walking home with her mother when she walked into a string.

The glass-coated strings have been banned since 2016; however, critics say there has been little enforcement. It is a tradition in India and other parts of south Asia for kite-flying enthusiasts to have duels in the skies using sharp strings to cut a rival's kite.

"You shut one street seller down and another two replace him. Bans don't work. It is up to Indians themselves to realise they are killing people," Arun Sarao, a policeman who works in Delhi said.

When people feel the string caught around their necks they panic and pull at it to try and remove it, often cutting themselves further. Last August three people died after becoming entangled in kite stings in the space of 20 days.

Narendra Kumar, a young delivery agent, was on his scooter when the string wrapped around his wind pipe. In his panic he fell off his scooter and was run over by a car. Some scooter riders have become so worried about being caught in dangling kite strings that they have resorted to wearing an improvised foam belt around their necks.

White Horse Kite Flyers Code of Practice

Always fly safely

Always be considerate to others using the same area be it noise or physical intrusion into their space.

Always fly legally taking in to account all National, Local and CAA restrictions.

Never fly at a height of more than 60m above ground level, in the UK unless a CAA clearance is in force. (as at festivals) IF YOU DON'T KNOW.......ASK.

Never fly a kite in wet or stormy weather. Always try and keep you line dry.

Never fly near power lines, transmission towers or aerials.

Never fly near airfields.

Never fly a kite with anything metallic in the line.

Always when tethering a kite ensure that the ground anchor is suitable (see BKFA report 6 June 06).

Always use a brake line when flying large kites.

Always wear good quality gloves when flying large powerful kites.

Always give priority to domestic animals particularly if they are showing signs of distress.

Always clear up after yourself, especially lines, tails and bits of plastic that could trap, choke or injure domestic animals.

Never fly near kite-eating trees.

Note the use of traction kiting at Barbury Castle is forbidden by law.

Finally remember....your kites can get really quite lonely up high in the sky; just occasionally, look up and give them a SMILE. It will make you feel better too.
