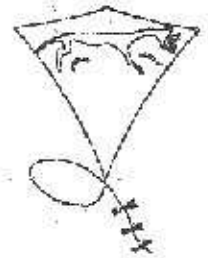

The Olympia Model Exhibition 1997

I received a telephone call from "Electric" Arthur recently, asking if the Irvine Federation of Falling Fauna would be available for some dates now that we had moved into a new year. After our long discussion Arthur let slip the fact that there had been a lack of material for the latest Cowpat Hill and would I like to create a small missive on the Model Engineering Exhibition so here it is!

We became acquainted with the exhibition about eight years ago, just after we were introduced into kiting. Some friends in the village, where we live, mentioned to Rosie that the exhibition took place at Olympia each year over the Xmas holidays and there was a stand with kites on it. Well there were no arguments, New Year's Day was a holiday and should be made full use of. We drove to London, parked the car in the multi story and paid our entry fee. Our son David was only four at the time and he found all the different models, trains, boats and planes really interesting, whilst Rosie spent hours talking to strange men about steam trains! We searched for the kite stand and eventually found a large display of kites in a remote area on the first floor well away from all the activities. Unfortunately the stand was not manned and so we were unable to make any enquiries about any kite related activities or clubs in our area. We were quite disappointed with the lack of anyone to talk to and said at the time that if we knew more we would be happy to man the stand. Not knowing who organised the event this state of affairs continued until 1996 when I happened to mention my feelings to Pete Dawson who said "That's organised by Ron Moulton, I think I've got his telephone number, would you like it?" answer was a resounding yes. I have Ron's book but never thought I would be in touch with him. A telephone conversation confirmed that he would be very grateful for any help with the stand. I mentioned this to Arthur at a club meeting and he too made contact with Ron. There were quite a number of White Horse Flyers manning the stand at the 1996/7 exhibition plus my father in his wheelchair and even he enjoyed it. It was well attended and we all had a really great time. I know that Arthur flew some ultra light single line kites around the gallery and I made lots of the WHKF paper indoor kites which were given away to passing children. There was a picture of the stand published in one of last year's Kiteflyers. I met up with Ron at the October Old Warden festival and asked if he wanted volunteers again. At that time he was unsure of the situation as the organiser was being changed. I raised this with Arthur before the AGM but he had not been contacted and so this was not raised there either. In early December I received an invitation to attend, from Ron in the post, which was a bit late to contact many people in time, however Arthur Dibble, Pete Dawson and myself all attended, in fact Pete built the stand and arranged all the kites on show so he made two trips this year. The stand was now in the main downstairs area and this year we had power so that we could show kiteflying videos. I made some ultralight kites from balsa and tissue paper which we flew around the stands and then gave away. Again all flyers who attended had a great time.

Ron delivered my kites back to me after the show and was very pleased with the way things had gone and asked me to thank those who had taken part. He will be organising the stand again this/next year and would be grateful for any help. It would be great to have a large WIKF presence at Olympia for all days of the show (it runs for six days) and we could be quite creative with more members helping. Members attending would be provided with

exhibitors passes allowing them access to all areas of the show. You are not tied to the stand all day and it is quite feasible to have a good look at all the other stands and events whilst taking full part in the stand.

Rokkaku Fighting

Do you find that the 'Team Rok' fights have become boring over the last few seasons?

How about starting a new type of contest?

The following is a suggestion to improve the situation, and has been prompted by discussions with flyers from other clubs.

Firstly, make the kites larger, say 4m high, so that they have to be flown by a team of four or more people. Secondly, restrict the flying line to a fixed length (200') to prevent the usual fight outcome of the team with the longest line winning. Thirdly, fly only 2 kites at any one time to ensure that teams do participate in the fight and don't hang about on the edge of the field. Fourthly, divide the arena with a line or rope into two sections. Each team must stay on its side of this dividing line.

The object of the battle is to bring down the opposing Kite by tipping, pulling down or cutting the line.

Points could be awarded as follows:-

Cutting your opponents' line	10 points
Tipping your opponents' kite onto your side of the line	8 points
Tipping your opponents' kite onto their side of the line	6 points
Pulldown (this must be onto your side of the line)	6 points

If both kites tangle and come down together 4 points for whichever side of the line they land on.

The best score after three rounds wins. This would of course be repeated for however many teams wish to compete, with winning teams fighting it out to find an overall champion.

Is anyone interested in trying this out? I am prepared to build myself a 4m Rokkaku but I will need some opposition to test out these suggestions.

Please let me have your views, comments or better still, your challenge.

Re: Fighter kite review in my club mag!

Having flown several ripstop fighter kites I admitted passion for which Johnny Busing can't fathom. I recently had a friend Peter Dawson [WHKF@compuserve.com] White Horse Kite Flyers Club [united kingdom] send me some much needed new blood.

The addition of the MAC fighter and the Martyn Lawrence-GEM has indeed revitalised my rather odd collection of fighter kites.

MAC FIGHTER-Indian style [traditional] fighter. The advertisement from MAC reads:
PRECISION MADE FIGHTER KITES

Your fighter kite has been designed to fly in light to moderate winds. Made and tested by M W McLeod.

This kite is an official just got to have one in your fighter kite bag. I have indeed flown traditional Indian paper fighters. This Ladies and Gentlemen is one ripstop version which in my opinion actually duplicates the treasured Indian paper fighter. It spins very easily in either direction, dives and recoveries are a snap! Construction is top notch, 16 inches by 21.5 inches across. Somewhat squat in appearance it is so lightweight that one must keep on the line while doing horizontal sweeps, otherwise it simply runs out of steam! This is not an indication of a dislike more of an observation about the kites performance. Also, I believe it gives us a unique insight into Mr McLeods fighting style...ie. he simply doesn't rest. This kite is quick and turns on a dime. The centre spar is wood [sanded] into an elliptical shape.

The cross spar is fibreglass. I believe most of the construction to be hot knifed and bonded. Each kite is signed by MAC and seems to be test flown before shipping [the bridle setting is perfect right out of the bag]. The colour of my kite is bright fluorescent green with a black diamond shape on the bottom tail.

In fact I'm considering contacting the manufacturer in order to obtain more of his kites. Too bad they aren't available from a local supplier in Canada. I think that if more people were exposed to this level of affordable, quality fighter kites the sport might grow much faster than it presently is in North America. Yes! I do like this kite.

Kite Flying Safety Tips

The NEVERS of Kite Flying

- Fly a kite in wet or stormy weather, try to keep your kite line dry.
- Fly a kite near power lines, transmission towers or aeriels.
- Fly a kite with wire or anything metallic in the line.
- Fly a strong pulsing kite without wearing GLOVES
- Leave odd bits of flying line etc on the flying site.
- Fly a kite at over 200 feet.

*Kite festivals may have C.A.A. clearance to fly higher.....ASK!

The Things to AVOID

- Motorways, roads, car parks railway lines or buildings.
- Airfields and low flying air traffic patterns.
- Members of the public...stunt flyers please take care!
- Those kite eating trees.
- Animals, they can be frightened by kites.

Remember...your kites can get really quite lonesome up high in the sky, just occasionally, look up and give them a little SMILE.

...AND PLEASE, MIND THOSE POWER LINES!
