After considering all the restrictions and demands being imposed upon us and the immediate need for much larger investment we now will turn all our efforts into bringing you an even better event for May 2005. This only affects the Middle Wallop event and we are at present trying to organise another event for 2004. Details will be posted as and when they become available.

FANO 2004-06-23

Wednesday afternoon 5 of us met up at Harwich and loaded all our gear into Jerry's Previa. Everything went in including the case of beer, bottles of wine, gin, vodka, whiskey, rum..... A bit of a game getting the car with top box into a place where it did not foul the upper deck but all was well and we sailed on time at 18.00. Located our very pleasant inboard cabin and went for a meal. This was where the rot started: smoked salmon, prawns, cray fish, smoked halibut, more prawns and that was just the starter. This was followed by roast beef veg, salad; desserts, cheese and biscuits washed down with a couple of bottles of wine then to the bar for coffee and,,,,,, that was the way the weekend continued.

A passable nights sleep in some very low bunks and very flat crossing had us up by 09.00 for breakfast. Docking in Esbjerg at mid day local time and a new game to get the car off, got us to the Fano ferry just in time to see one leave. This did give us time to pick up some post cards that got home 5 hours before we did. Only 30 minutes wait and we were at sea again for the short crossing and into Nordby tourist office to pick up the apartment keys. We were lucky to have the help of Brian, Mary and Mark who had done it all many times before and they led us to the apartment. We stopped only long enough to drop off some bags and then drove ¹/₄ mile to the beach.

The site that met our eyes was one we shall never forget. There is no way words can do it justice but the five of us with combined kiting experience of over 100 years just stood there gob-smacked. 14 kilometres of hard sand up to ½ kilometre wide with up to 8000 kites in the air!!! The buggies had a dedicated 5-kilometre stretch and with winds force 5 to 6 straight off the North Sea were those boys motoring?

We drove the length of the beach taking photographs all the way. It is safe to drive on the sand and there is even a bus route running the full length. We came off at the southern end and went back via a super market to pick up provisions for evening meals and breakfast.

Friday morning we were on the beach early, (well, before mid-day) and with the high wind choice of a kite was difficult but Jerry decided the answer was the large Bol. We used a metre square sand drag buried a metre deep and thought this would hold it so we inflated it. I wish some one had had a video camera running, the sand drag didn't even try and it was off down the beach: Jerry dived on it; I dived on it; two of us and half a ton of sand would have left any buggy behind had it not been for 3 heavy duty lines we found holding down even larger kites. We will have the bruises for some time to remember this entertainment.

We had taken very few kites suitable for these wind speeds and gradually collected a pile requiring Franchesca (hope I've spelt it right this time), Jon and Jerry to spend evenings repairing them and Carolyn untangling bridles. I just kept the glasses topped up. However we did manage to get the teddy rig up under a Cody and bung a few bears. Apparently the film crew heard about this and turned up just as we had packed up so we promised to do it all again the next day and true to their word they turned up and spent an hour filming our silly games this time from a large para-sled. I can't wait to see the results when they are published in September.

On Friday evening we attended what proved to be a chance to mingle and purchase brilliant German engineered kite bits and various souvenirs such as pins and patches. Local beer and hot dogs were available if you were thirsty or hungry. Saturday evening at the same location was the auction, another indescribable event. The auctioneer doesn't stop. He moves up and down the raised gang way and if you understand the lingo he is apparently very funny. All proceeds go to supporting a third world school project.

The weather was mainly kind with only a few rain showers and some bright sky but the wind went through everything we had taken and three of us had to go to a local shop to get wind proof coats. These were at sale prices and you could get an $\pounds 80$ jacket for $\pounds 30$. The best money I spent all weekend.

When we weren't trying to fly it was walk or drive up and down the beach to marvel at the latest additions or to chat with old acquaintances.

The trip home was just the reverse of the trip out except that with a few hours to spare we did the tourist bit round the island and got to see the incredible exhibition of the early German line climber for aerial photography (If the editor wasn't pushing for this article before deadline I would sort out the inventors name)

I could have gone on about all the arches, spinners, line garbage etc. but could not hope to convey the atmosphere and spectacle. Pictures are up on my web site. Suffice it to say I WILL BE GOING BACK TO FANO.


A new project.





Kite activities getting Stopped.

As you sit there contemplating the next kite to buy/build/enjoy, spare a thought to what's going on around you! In the past week (mid June) three events over the country are showing that our sport is very much under attack.....

From the Diary page you will see a large black mark crossing out the Middle Wallop event in August - the story goes that the event is being subjected to the sins of being too successful, and there are both financial and safety pressures being the reason to it's failure.

Just this weekend I am hearing that the beach at Camber Sands, East Sussex is under threat to stop kite surfing, and possibly other forms of kiteing, an open meeting with the wardens of that area is to take place to discuss the situation, I await to hear what exactly what's happening.

But the situation is much clearer on the other side of the country - Pendine Sands in Wales is to ban ALL vehicular access onto the beach due to an incident that involved an uninsured quad bike, the child riding it with no helmet, and a parked car! This beach is world renowned for being the UK's speed records of the 1930's. But no, the council is closing the beach as of the 4th of July (nothing to celebrate there then!). Land yachts and buggies have been using it for years; organised events have run there to no-ones dismay. Talk about a knee-jerk reaction.

So why do I moan? Does these events affect me? Well, yes they do - it affects all of us! This is not a question of "Oh, those buggy boys are a menace", or "there is a need for some control that the local council should do". It's a case of complacency!

We all want to have our bit of fun and not be harassed by others! Yes I am a buggy pilot, and the loss of Pendine, where I have been and planned to visit again this year for buggying is close to my (and my son's) heart! The loss of Wallop has meant that STACK cannot run it's final round of competitions, and a number of people depended on that to get their UK rankings to compete in Euro cup in September. Camber Sands is just another beach that can be scratched off your holiday list where kites are being banned (There's bans down on some beaches in Devon and Cornwall already! if you want one closer to home, there's a common land field in Oxford with a power kite ban!).

Our hobby is under attack, and we are doing nothing to stop it, what national organisations there are seem ill equipped to respond - STACK has no effect - it's too small, BBC has the membership to act, but are staying within their aspect of the sport obviously. KSGB? Do me a favour! and our new national organisation BKFA are struggling to get started but no one will take them seriously enough until it's to late, so they do not have to mandate of enough clubs to call themselves the one "National" blanket organisation to face officialdom - one of their aims was to get Sports Council recognition for the sport as a whole, giving us a voice.

By the time you read this one beach will be closed, another under threat, Middle Wallop is the third kite festival called of this year, and STACK 'may/may not' have a new site to compete, but at a cost that'll put a number of competitors off (an extra $\pounds 10$

or so per competitor on top is muttered - making my entry fee for that one event to over ± 30).

Sorry to be so depressing, but it's coming the time to stand up and be counted if you want this sport to continue and progress. How can we resolve this, start by letting your club know you care. Think about where the BKFA, or something similar, can or should help. United we can make a difference - so long as we're not too late! But at the moment we are divided, and they are using that weakness to affect a 'fete accompli' on us all.

We thought it a joke a short while ago that I instigated a risk assessment over making our workshop kite, but this was after hearing that MKF were being asked for one, and ours has been used! The club's insurance company is now asking questions over our equipment and it's safety - extra expense!!

The incident at Lytham St Anne's two years ago and the immediate ban there is being slowly dissolved thanks to Fexifoil and others working behind the scenes, so it can be done. The one glimmer of light for Pendine is that the local club is getting backing from all over the country, though the restrictions the council has mooted are extreme (they talk of a maximum number restriction and £10m liability insurance - the first to demand this level anywhere in the country and no insurance company will touch it). At least in Essex they started to talk about the situation first, hope they can sort it out. Middle Wallop - Roy and Hailey hope to run something again next year, but in what format???

Kite Flying Safety Tips

The NEVERS of Kite Flying

• Fly a kite in wet or stormy weather, try to keep your kite line dry.

- Fly a kite near power lines, transmission towers or aerials.
- Fly a kite with wire or anything metallic in the line.
- Fly a strong pulling kite without wearing GLOVES.
- Leave odd bits of flying line etc on the flying site.
- Fly a kite at over 200 feet*.
- *Kite festivals may have C.A.A. clearance to fly higher.....ASK!

The Things to AVOID

- Motorways, roads, car parks railway lines or buildings.
- Airfields and low flying air traffic patterns.
- Members of the public....stunt flyers please take care!
- Those kite eating trees.
- Animals, they can be frightened by kites.
- Remember...your kites can get really quite lonely up high in the sky, just occasionally, look up and give them a little SMILE.

... AND PLEASE, MIND THOSE POWER LINES!

Where the WHKF go to fly their kites
