

Barbury Castle

At our April meeting at Barbury Castle we were approached by the farmer who runs livestock on the Castle fields and other local sites. He had recently had to have several sheep put down because their legs had been severely damaged by getting tangled with lines left in the fields. He was asking us to restrict our flying to the Castle field only. We explained that we had previously been requested by the council to separate single and multi-line flying for public safety. We also stressed that we are a responsible club and our members would not leave litter of any kind on this site and we assured him that none of our members operated any form of traction kiting there. A few weeks previously, an old lady had been knocked down by an unknown inconsiderate traction kiter who did not even stop to apologise.

These sorts of behaviour could result in us loosing the site we have used for about 25 years. We can not control the actions of others who are not club members flying at non club dates but PLEASE can you try and spread the word about the responsible way to fly and if you see litter, lines, wires or tails please pick them up and dispose of them correctly even if it is not your fault. We only get a good name by hard work.




Then and Now... a look at how kiting has changed over the years.



Newbie sports kite flier confessions 8

Phew! On Saturday at this year's Swindon festival, wasn't the weather awful? After just standing out in it I was more exhausted than if I had been flying on a normal day – slept like a log that night, and my partner Debbie got a red face from wind burn.

Anyway, as I am starting a new job, I guess that Swindon will be the last festival attended for a while, and that this will probably be the last article for a long time. Therefore I thought it would be good to look back to see what stands out in the last 4 years of newbie kite flying. But first, as promised in the last article, a bit on the wind window and releasing line tension to stall a sport kite in high winds.



The wind window

The wind window is the surface that the kite can fly across. The surface is part of a spherical dome whose radius is the flying line length. The flier is at the origin of the radius. (If the flyer moves, then the wind window moves with him.) The amount by which the wind window extends from the downwind direction around the flyer depends on: wind, kite type and set-up, and can be anything from a few degrees up to around 90°.

A sport kite can fly not only downwind of the flyer, but also off to the side, and the basic idea of the wind window is that it is the region around the flyer where the kite can fly. The advantage of this for stalling the kite in higher winds is that the flyer does not have to run as fast if the kite is being stalled off to one side towards the edge of the wind window. For example, if there is a 25mph gale and the kite is downwind of the flyer, then to allow the kite to drift with the wind would require either that the flyer lets go of the lines (usually not a good idea), or else somehow move at 25mph in the direction of the kite. However if the kite is off to one side then the flyer does not have to move so fast in order to allow the kite to float with the breeze. How fast does the kite flyer have to move?

– Well, this should really be a question in John Browning's puzzle corner. The answer is dependant on the flying line length and on the angle between the lines and the wind direction. Let's suppose that 25metre lines are being used, and the kite has been flown just above the ground to 85° away from the downwind direction. Then with lots of trigonometry, one can show that to allow the kite to float for a metre, the flyer need only move 1/10th metre, and consequently need only move at an average speed of 2½ mph. The kite still moves at 25mph, but most of the movement is across the wind window and the flyer does not need to move to compensate for this. The steps of the calculation be can found in the notes at www.seek2know.org.uk/kites/PJKites/PJKite.html.

So, impressions of newbie kite flying over 4 years. For myself, one of the frustrating things was relearning kite tricks several times. I would get a trick working consistently, only to find out a few months later that I could no longer do it. Usually it wasn't the different wind conditions, but rather that I had missed some detail that I must have been doing instinctively when first able to do the trick. For one trick, the 540 flat spin, this has happened three times, each time discovering a new essential detail of the trick. For the comet, a few months ago it was beautiful. Currently it is impossible.

The good thing about all the failing at tricks is that somewhere along the way, one gets very proficient at the recoveries from crashes and line tangles. Somehow it becomes instinctive to untangle lines that are wrapped around the wings and turn around and re-launch the kite, all from the far end of the lines, without having to walk to the kite. Now if only I could explain how it is done... ... Perhaps that is how tricks feel to those who are naturals at them.

A big issue for other flyers has been dogs and their owners. Not for us so far. We ourselves like dogs and have had the luck to peacefully coexist in the same fields as many dogs. Of course there has been the sheep dogs that wanted to herd us, the large bouncy dogs who brought us sticks to throw, and dogs that have thought about chasing those colourful things that leap into the sky. But usually a firm "no" or call to us has dissuaded the dog. (Watching old Barbara Woodhouse videos can help here.) But unlike some of the people who have flown near us, we haven't ourselves encountered kite-eating dogs. The main things we didn't do when a dog headed for a kite were: 1) Run towards the dog shouting and waving arms frantically — These actions appear to be doggy talk for "please play with my kite". 2) Try to kick a dog — The mut is part of someone's family and owners can get very angry when they see family members being attacked.

Anyway, for the last 2 years it has been enjoyable and challenging trying to write up one's thoughts, and I hope that they have been educational and entertaining to read. And if I have to wait until retirement before writing again, perhaps that series of articles will be called "oldie sports kite flier confessions".

DIEPPE 2010 (11-19 September)

This year The International Dieppe Kite Festival celebrates it's 30th anniversary. In recognition of this flyers are being asked to make a "Candle Kite" of specified dimensions to be flown at the festival. Plans for this can be found by logging in to the web site and using the link on the forum or "Documents" page.

At the same event we are also trying to support the AKA and in particular Region13. We are therefore promoting the idea of a series of banners brought by members attending. 
We will try and get a photo of them all lined up with the people who made them and see if we can get it in to the AKA magazine.

Following a wet Swindon Kite Festival I am often asked, "Why don't we change the Date?" Fair question but there are several reasons that we do not do this.

Then of course if the summer is warm it will mean there is a stationary anticyclone over us and that leads to very low winds. Certainly this does give a chance for the other passion of kite flyers so the bar would make a good profit. But we would still get the question "Can't you change the date to some time when there is wind?" Are we never content? No it comes with the hobby.

So the answer to those who have asked is "No, the tradition remains that the Swindon Kite Festival will be held on the weekend following the first May Bank Holiday"

INSURANCE

It has become evident that there is some confusion about what our insurance covers, so this is an attempt to clarify the situation. Below are the simplified details as specified by our insurers.

At all times the appropriate Risk Assessment must be in place. If children or vulnerable adults are involved any required clearances must be obtained and a Child protection policy instigated. The clearance is the responsibility of the individual and other paperwork can be found on our web site. In the event of an accident the BKFA Accident Report form must be completed and passed to The Club Chairman directly or via another committee member.

The insurance will not cover you if you are contravening any law or byelaw, if you are not complying with WHKF "Code of Practice" or are flying with out due care and consideration.

Robinson's Ramble


There used to be a festival in Madison, Wisconsin, USA; called "Kites on Ice"; I thought on the Saturday at our festival we might be able to call our festival, "Kites in the Snow". It was 9°c with a 25mph northeasterly wind in our faces, I realise you wouldn't get snow at that temperature however it certainly felt like it was possible. Consequently we were well down on spectators this year, some of you might think this isn't a bad thing because there is more space for the Kite Flyers, however, we fund the event mainly from charging the traders a fee, with the lack of potential customers for these traders it becomes increasingly difficult each year to get people to trade at the event. It's been two years now at Brinkworth and we have lost money on the event each year!

I think you will all agree that insurance is quite a good idea, the amount of members taking the additional Personal Liability Insurance was very disappointing, we just about got enough to cover the minimum fee, which equates to £9 per person. This insurance covers you worldwide when you are *not* flying with or on behalf of the club; it also includes parachuting soft toys from kites or fixed objects. I hope you are aware that the club insurance only covers you when you are flying with or on behalf of the club. Talking of the club insurance, we have just received the premium for the next year and there has been a very large increase over last year, this is due to the insurers now insuring us according to how many members we have, as you know we have always charged our membership fee for the family, due to this change by the insurers I would say that a large topic of discussion at this years AGM will be how we charge in the future.

The date for the club workshop this year is $23^{rd}/24^{th}$ October, the kite will be a 3do, this is a flat surface kite by Paul & Helene Morgan. We cancelled the workshop in February with Paul & Helene, so Paul has to re-price the kite due to any price increase there may have been in materials since February. Paul will price for a basic kit but he says that he will bring along some extra materials so that if you want to make the kite wider or taller you can, and then you can pay him direct for the extra materials. The booking form will be out in July, and will be sent to those members who have supported our workshops in the past, and then if we don't fill all of the spaces we'll open up the workshop to all members, if you haven't done one of our workshops but would like to, please contact me.

3Do by Paul & Helene Morgan



Sky Surfer upgrade

It has been a lot of years since I first got a Sky Surfer and started bringing it to our events so that we could have something in the air even on flat calm days. For those of you who don't know the Sky Surfer it is a battery powered radio controlled model parascender suitable for use in winds up to about 2mph. It consists of a 4foot canopy above a cart fitted with all the gear and a pusher prop. It is steered by pulling on the canopy shrouds and climbs on throttle increase. They came ready to fly from the box including a 2 channel, 27MHz radio system and at the time cost about £165. Those of us who had them have some great memories, like getting into a thermal on the Isle of Wight and having trouble getting back down or finding thermals over the hangars at Wroughton and watching it climb as if in a lift.

This version became very difficult to get and then suddenly a couple of years ago there was an influx of a Chinese copy on ebay selling at the remarkable price of £25. I had to get one of these to try and it appeared to be identical but there were problems with the quality of the electronics, the reliability of the motor and the capacity of the battery. Combine this with the price and availability of the original battery, nicads going out of fashion and the fact that they came with a single fixed frequency these were not that successful although to be fair I did manage to get some flights out of mine.

Then at Bedford Festival I see some one else flying one and went to see if it was the new or old variety. It turned out to be Dave Holt flying it and he said it was one of the Chinese copies but as he did a low pass something didn't look right so when he landed it a closer look revealed major changes. To summarise you take the model to pieces and throw away all the electrical bits and replace them with:-

35MHz or 2.4GHz radio system, that will also give you spare channels to control other things.

Brushless Outrunner motor and speed controller

3 cell 1000mAhr 11V LiPo battery

7x4 pusher prop with cone

Futaba servo

This all fits in the original chassis although the battery is a bit of a squeeze and has to be held in with an elastic band. Reading on the internet it looks as if you could possibly get away with just replacing the motor and speed controller but you would have to play about with the battery voltage for the receiver and it's speed control output. The motor, speed controller and battery would set you back about £30. Radios can be picked up on ebay at various prices.

This is all worthwhile when you see the performance. It is VERY fast and can get to very high altitudes. If you try and climb too fast it even loops and a hard turn will produce a horizontal loop. You don't believe me; have a look at http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ToLFWlcmbo4

I haven't found any detail on wind speeds it will cope with but looking at this video I would think 6mph would be no problem. Flying time is upwards of 30 minutes so there is plenty of capacity for high intensity navigation lights for night flying. Dave is so impressed he has 5 of these copies with various modifications or just for spares.

If you want to have a go your self just contact me and I will give you details of the required parts and their suppliers as given to me by Dave.

By the time this article goes to press I should have all the parts and be well on the way to getting mine built so will report in a later issue. Who knows with this extra power it could be the answer to parachuting teddy bears on windless days.



WHITE HORSE KITE FLYERS CODE OF PRACTICE

Always fly safely.

Always be considerate to others using the same area be it noise or physical intrusion into their space.

Always fly legally taking in to account all national, local and CAA restrictions and by-laws.

Never fly at a height of more than 60m above ground level, in the UK unless a CAA clearance is in force (as at kite festivals). If you don't know what the clearance is ASK!

Never fly a kite in wet or stormy weather. Always try and keep your line dry.

Never fly a kite near power lines, transmission towers or aerials.

Never fly near Motorways, roads, car parks or railways.

Never fly near airfields.

Never fly a kite with anything metallic in the line.

When tethering a kite ensure that the ground anchor is suitable (see BKFA report 6 June 06).

When flying large kites always use a brake line.

Always wear good quality gloves when flying large powerful kites.

Always give priority to domestic animals particularly if they are showing signs of distress.

Always clear up after yourself, especially lines, tails and bits of plastic that could trap, choke or injure domestic or wild animals.

Never fly near those kite-eating trees.

NOTE: Use of traction at Barbury Castle is forbidden by law.

Finally remember.....your kites can get really quite lonely up high in the sky; just occasionally, look up and give them a SMILE. It will make you feel better too.

WHITE HORSE KITE FLYERS meet at Barbury Castle Country Park on the second Sunday of each month.

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
