

Welcome to another magazine, finally the sun is shining and it's warmed up a treat. Here is a warm chicken salad to enjoy on those nice evenings with a chilled glass of wine ©

For 2 people
1 chicken breast
Pinch of salt, pepper
Pinch of dried thyme
Splash of olive oil
Mixed salad leaves (of your choice)
Baby plum tomatoes x8
Cucumber ¼ sliced into thin slices
Pepper sliced into thin slices
Grated carrot
Red onion thinly sliced
Olive oil
Balsamic vinegar



Add the salt, pepper and thyme in a bowl with a splash of olive oil, coat the chicken breast in the oil mixture and bake at 200 for 20 mins or until cooked. Put the salad leaves on a plate top with the rest of the salad ingredients and drizzle over the olive oil and balsamic vinegar

Slice the warm chicken breast and place over the salad and enjoy

### The dangers of our hobby.

From the Jerusalem Times: Apr 16, 2018

Palestinians in Gaza flew a kite over the border carrying a fire bomb, which started a fire where it touched down.

The Molotov cocktail-laden kite bearing the colours of the Palestinian flag that landed near a southern Israeli kibbutz on Sunday is not the first effort by Gazan Palestinians to start fires on agricultural land with the fire bombs, Haaretz reported. At least three actually have started fires; one reportedly fell in Gazan territory.

The Gaza-border area Eshkol Regional Council on Sunday released a statement asking residents to be vigilant. "In the last 24 hours, there have been several cases of kite flying with Molotov cocktails from the strip to our territory. In all cases, the bottles fell close to the border and caused fires, without casualties... The public is asked to be alert and to report on any unusual incident of fires in the area."

Note to GOGs; this would not be covered by our insurance.

I have seen further articles that say the Israelis are retaliating by cutting down the kites using drones. It is starting to sound more like a computer game all the time.

Illuminating a Cruikshank Cube.

Having been lucky enough to win one of Bob's glass cubes depicting a Cassanges' ring I felt it needed more of a display than the nice box it came in. Being glass it seemed to lend its self to illumination.

First I found a piece of mahogany about 2cm thick and cut a square of about 9cm. This was sanded smooth and the edges bevelled. I then marked out a central square the size of the base of the cube and drew a line across the centre parallel to one edge. On this line I marked 2 equally spaced points and drilled 5mm diameter holes. The next step was to cut out the square to about 2mm deep using a chisel to keep the edges clean and a router in the middle. On the other side I cut a channel about 7mm wide and deep from one of the holes to the opposite edge.





Now you have to choose the 2 LEDs you want to use, I prefer slow colour changing but you can use any; single colour, flashing or steady. Insert these from the bottom and solder together the long leg of one to the short leg of the other.

Next you have to prepare your power lead. I buy a 1m m/m USB and cut it in half so that I have 2 then carefully strip back about 5cm of insulation, cut off the screen and green and white cores leaving only the red and black. Using

your soldering iron insulation and tin Slide a piece of of these wires and remaining long LED the short leg. Slide the joints. Fold all channel and fix



strip back about 5mm of the ends of these wires. insulating sleeve up each solder the red wire to the leg and the black wire to the insulating sleeve over the wires in to the everything in place with

hot glue. Once it is cool you can sand the base flat.

#### **Sky Chat**

This "Sky Chat" is slightly different from usual as it relates to the last two promotion events we have attended. The first was the Boscombe Down Museum at Old Sarum (those who remember their history was a rotten borough) that Don Baggett had us invited to. As most of you know I am a bit of aircraft NUTTER but what a display of aircraft there. This was an Open Day when the friends of the museum invite various groups associated with flying etc. to display their particular interests. Had a great time wandering around sitting and nosing into so many cockpits, talk about a child in a sweet shop it was one of those days and we still had time to promote "The Club",

Next event we were invited to was the Tenth anniversary of the Westmill Wind Farm (that is the one you can see from Barbury beyond Swindon) of generating wind power. We were given plenty of space to fly in but it was rather a long way from the hub of activities and the toilets, Still we had wind and in the main it stayed dry and "The Club" put on a good display of kites and line laundry and the workshop made over 100 kites, just shows you that the children there made their parents walk more than they would have liked. As I said it stayed mainly dry until we were packing up and we had a heavy shower, just right to get the marguee nice and wet and us. I was lucky that the following days were hot and sunny to dry them all out in. #### White Horse Kite Flyers Code of Practice

Always fly safely

Always be considerate to others using the same area be it noise or physical intrusion into their space.

Always fly legally taking in to account all National, Local and CAA restrictions.

Never fly at a height of more than 60m above ground level, in the UK unless a CAA clearance is in force. (as at festivals) IF YOU DON'T KNOW.......ASK.

Never fly a kite in wet or stormy weather. Always try and keep you line dry.

Never fly near power lines, transmission towers or aerials.

Never fly near airfields.

Never fly a kite with anything metallic in the line.

Always when tethering a kite ensure that the ground anchor is suitable (see BKFA report 6 June 06).

Always use a brake line when flying large kites.

Always wear good quality gloves when flying large powerful kites.

Always give priority to domestic animals particularly if they are showing signs of distress.

Always clear up after yourself, especially lines, tails and bits of plastic that could trap, choke or injure domestic animals.

Never fly near kite-eating trees.

Note the use of traction kiting at Barbury Castle is forbidden by law.

Finally remember....your kites can get really quite lonely up high in the sky; just occasionally, look up and give them a SMILE. It will make you feel better too.
