The meeting was opened by the President who thanked Dave for organizing the venue. The greenbridge has been taken over by Weatherspoons who have closed the pub for refurbishment.

Matters arising: there were no matters arising.

Chairman's Report: apologies were given for the late change of venue, I count myself very fortunate with the support I have behind me from the rest of the committee and that I have Neil as President so that he can carry out the formal introductions. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the other members of the committee who have given me such great support during the year. I said that one main aim would be to improve communication within the club. I have tried through the magazine, the web site and the forum, email and talking to people at events, I have had little response. I accept that many people are not as heavily into the use of computers as I am and would prefer me to use snail mail and the phone. I would love to have the time to do this, but with email I can contact so many people at one time and get a copy of what I have said for future reference. Anyway lets see if a few more of you can join the forum and the chat room. There have been a few problems due to changes in our web site hosting but hopefully that is now behind us & once you have registered in this forum you will not have to do so again.

This year seems to have had a predominance of poor weather and cancellations. We started the trend with the cancellation of Stowe and the wettest Swindon I can remember. Sadly other cancellations included Kennet, Middle Wallop and Chale.Let's hope for a better 2005. Two club projects have been completed in the year, firstly the play sail back in the spring and only last month the kite arch. The sail has been flown and has received good acclaim. The arch completed has 67 elements that were sewn together by a group of us one Sunday and has been successfully flown. There are several ideas on the books for next year and if you have read the magazine you will know that Neil is having some thoughts of about others. In February Sam Huston ran a tri-d-box workshop this went well as usual with Sam's very professional presentation. Another workshop is planned for next year & details will be published in the magazine and on the website as soon as details are confirmed. Various new club merchandise has become available during the year including a new patch at a very reasonable price also jackets & shirts.

A new governing body for kite flying, the BKFA has been formed this year & the committee has decided that we should be affiliated to this and representatives of the club have attended the inaugural meetings. You should have seen the new membership application published in the magazine & the web site to include details of family members who have to be included for insurance purposes. The very sad thing that happened this year was the death of Madge Peters, Janet's mum. She has been an integral part of WHKF from its inception even helping to finance us in the early days. She was like a mum to all of us and she will be sadly missed.

Hon Secretary Report: it's difficult to do a report as the chairman covers the year in his. The festival made a loss this year of £342.00. The weather was against us but there were things going on in the hangers. The historic Kite society would like to attend the event again next year to show a bigger collection of their kites. Gibson girls, rockets and of course Mikio who went to a local school and dressed in traditional costume all contributed towards the event. Mikio couldn't fly a kite outside so went into the hanger and made origami for the children. Thanks to the buggy club for making the evening a fun social evening. Looking at events over the year, Cleethorpes saw some of the best winds seen at a festival. Bedford for the social in the evening & the Isle of Wight for flying right on your doorstep. The club insurance is with Perkins Slade & we cannot buy £10.000 worth of cover. There is a mistake on the new membership form this needs to read £5,000. Insurance is now based on members needed to be covered; hence we need to list all family members who need insuring. Thankyou for everyone support over the year. We need as much support as we can at the festival for erecting arenas & breaking down on the Sunday & thank you to all those who helped this year.

<u>Hon Treasurers Report:</u> we have £8.881in the bank at present this will be greatly reduced at the time of the festival. Everyone was happy with the report Brian Smith proposed the accounts Don Baggett seconded them.

<u>Cowpat Editors report:</u> than you to everyone who has supported the magazine over the last year. If there any suggestions or changes you would like to see in the magazine then please let Tracy know it's your magazine and your chance to have your say.

<u>U.S.A. Report:</u> Ron looks after our American members. Our thanks go to Ron for doing such a great job. Our liability insurance doesn't cover our American members. So all they receive is a magazine. We have a total of 8 American members.

<u>Election Of Officers:</u> election of chair Arthur was nominated, seconded by Jon Barker, Pete Dawson & Ken Hay vote was unanimous Arthur duly elected. Election of vice chair Dave Thompson nominated by Dave Robinson, Pete Willis nominated

by Pete Dawson. A vote was taken by a show of hands there was a vote of 17 to 16 in favour of Dave Thompson. Dave Thompson duly elected as vice chair. Secretary Di Baggett nominated Dave Robinson a vote taken Dave Duly elected. Treasurer Dave Thompson nominated Janet Robinson Janet duly elected. We have been offered assistance to run the bar on the Saturday and the licence will be applied for to include Friday night. The buggy club wishes to run the speed trial and will have a circuit. We need volunteers to erect the site on the Friday. We are going to hire a marquee, Dave is getting quotes. The buggy boys don't want to step on Marla's toes but would like to hold to auction 10 items after Marla's raffle. Roy Broadly offered his cooling equipment if we want to buy barreled lager.

The rocket and paper plane people have been invited. With guests coming over for the event if anybody could offer guests accommodation please contact the committee. It was suggested we need some form of entertainment on the Saturday night.

Other Events: Ralf Masserski workshop voted the best teacher with the best instruction at Fort Warden. There are 20-25 places. In October we will have a Robert Brassington workshop. This year will be the 25<sup>th</sup> year of one sky one world. People who don't want to participate in the Ralf Masserski workshop with help Francesca would make a one sky one world kite with a tail that could be signed marking different events. If people are organizing events under the WHKF banner please can they let the club know the name of the event and the organizer to go into the diary for H&S and insurance details.

National Body Report: Neil Harvey, Phil Scarfe, attended the inaugural meeting of the BKFA & Pete Dawson felt that people were sitting on the fence. They would give it their sanction for 3 years. This meant the meeting could go ahead. A committee and council were formed. Phil & Neil were put forward to represent the club. Neil Invited Jerry Swift to take the floor 8 clubs are committed with 4 clubs in principal subject to their AGM say they would like to join. And 5 who definitely don't want to join. Jerry gave members the background on reasons for starting the BKFA up again. Neil proposed we join as a club for the minimum of 3 years this was carried forward.

Approval of BKFA Representatives Neil Harvey & Phil Scarfe were proposed by Dave Thompson, seconded by Doug Manners & Pete Willis.

Equipment for 2005 negotiations are underway with the Rummings for storage of the trailers to give Neil & Sue their space back Thanks goes to Neil & Sue for holding the equipment for so long.

Honorariums proposed by Arthur, Seconded by Jon Barker for Neil Harvey, Janet & Tracy. Matrix Management would like to put on another winter league at Barbury in March. The memorial seat for Ron Gunter will be left for the committee.

I spotted this in a recent copy of the Western Daily Press, dated 20/12/04:

**KITES TO MAKE CLEAN ENERGY:** High altitude kites could generate clean energy at a cost comparable with that of polluting power stations, researchers claimed yesterday.

The "Laddermill" is a chain of controllable wing-like kites attached to a looped cable stretching up more than five miles.

Strong winds acting on the "kitewings" produce an upward force on one side of the loop and a downward force on the other, causing it to rotate and drive a generator. Delft Technical University in the Netherlands hopes to have a working model within four years.

### **DIEPPE 2004**

- More than a Kite Festival

As the heading suggests, in crossing the channel for this bi-annual festival there is so much more to do than 'just' kiting.

The 2004 *Festival de Cerf-Volant* took place between 11<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> September and we, like many others, visited for the second weekend. This was our fourth Dieppe – for us, a 'must' Festival and a mini holiday.

We opt for the Dover-Calais ferry (rather than the Newhaven-departing *Fastcat*) and drive through the French countryside. Using superbly efficient *peage* motorways, this takes around two hours, with nominal charges. Using *non-peage* roads is more enjoyable but of course takes somewhat longer. Either way, the roads are quiet and road users, in this part of France anyway, generally polite.

Dieppe, in the region of Normandy, was once a fashionable seaside resort, being the nearest beach to Paris. Today, it is industrialised and a busy fishing port. Dieppe is English-friendly and most welcoming, Union Flags fly (not a common site in France!) and kites are displayed in shops and restaurants. The festival takes place on the *Seafront Lawn*, adjacent to a pebble beach and the English Channel and is overlooked by a 15<sup>th</sup> century Chateau, beautifully flood lit at night. The Channel can be surprisingly colourful, presenting a nice photographic background.

Having checked into the Windsor, one of the lower cost but quite adequate Hotels overlooking the flying site, it was time for our customary lunch – fresh baguette (isn't everything fresh in France!!), Camembert and bottle of light red. The taste is so different, maybe they keep the best and export the rest to those they consider less discerning! Our first afternoon was spent looking around, talking to friends, old and new, and hearing tales of yesterdays 'perfect wind' - never heard that before.

Despite seemingly fewer kites this year, quality was not wanting. Top of my list had to be the Birdmen, Skybirds, and Bugs etc of George Peters, a personal hero of mine there wasn't a moment without at least one of his glorious kites flying. There was also Robert Brassington, the inimitably skilful Robertshaws, a Sky Dance reunion, Ray Bethell - without doubt everyone's friend, Didier Fermont – superbly constructed kites using simple materials, Robert Trepanier, Peter Lynn, Michel Gressier *et al.* Some wonderful kites were flown.

Invited guests representing countries from all Continents displayed kites and artefacts in small marquees, whilst a large marquee was dedicated to artistic kite making. Materials such as rose petals and honesty pods were used - impressive. There were also lessons in making small kites by the gentleman we shout 'thankyou Charlie' to at every WHKF Auction!

So, what makes Dieppe more than a Kite Festival?

There is the Chateau museum, WWII historical sites, local shops and fish market and close by Rouen, the region's capital. For those wanting to 'rest', there is the *Alternative British Tent*, which at times appears to compete with local Vintners! But one necessary, and non-kiting activity is, of course, dining out. Thursday dinner for us comprised *Moules et Frites* and *Tart de Pomme* in a harbour-side restaurant for a mere euro7 each!

Friday night is Party night, with the coming together of Invited Guests and kite flyers from all over the World. Entertainment starts on the *Bendy-Bus* that transfers everyone to the local recreation hall and continues with both organised entertainment, this year Malaysian Dancers, and various impromptu 'activities', including an American Lady (not selling raffle tickets so maybe it wasn't 'her'!) wearing what initially appeared to be a quite indecent costume - until one got closer, relatively speaking. Overall though, it's a great atmosphere, even though this year's food wasn't so good.

On Saturday morning one really must visit the outdoor street market. This fills the length of the *Grande-Rue* and minor streets off it. The stalls range from the professional to ones selling small quantities of homegrown produce. One can buy fresh fish, fruit, flowers and vegetables, numerous varieties of local cheese and sausage, cooked meats, olives, breads and local Normandy Cider (this pleased our Chairman), besides leather goods, clothes, furniture, arts and crafts etc. And the food produce is all so beautifully and caringly presented. It also looks 'real' – things aren't all the same size and same shape and same colour as is seemingly dictated by UK Supermarkets. The Dieppoise, as most French citizens, seem to enjoy a good life style - when will we be able to readily enjoy such fresh and reasonably priced offerings in

the UK? We always buy the local smoked garlic and Neufchatel cheese. This is the oldest of the Normandy cheeses, sold in a distinctive heart shape.

Back to kiting, Saturday evening's two-hour night fly is a must. The organisers go to town with this one. Music and light make it akin to an 80's heavy rock concert (showing my age? – so what!). And the kites are rather good, demonstrating typical Continental ingenuity. It is quite simply brilliant.

To complete the culinary element of the weekend, ten of us dined in The Newhaven Restaurant on Sunday evening. We were met with bottles of local cider on the tables - our Chairman was happy again. The *Marmite Dieppoise*, a fish stew with cream sauce was delicious.

So Monday and going-home day. We sought the route of the old Dieppe Grand Prix Circuit. Dieppe has a significant place in motor racing history - France was, after all, the birthplace of motor racing. It hosted the second and third ever *Grande Epreuves* in 1907 and 1908, using a circuit comprising some 48 miles of public roads. From 1929 until the mid 1930's, Dieppe again hosted races, albeit on a shorter 5-mile road circuit to the south of the town. It saw such names as Raymond Mays and Richard Seaman and France's Wimille, Benoist and Chiron racing in glorious ERAs, Bugattis, Alfas and Delages.

Having completed two laps, with photographic stops to 'replicate' some old pictures, we set off for Calais, paying flying (sorry!) visits to Berck-sur-Mer and Le Touquet – with their respective kiting associations. The weather had by now deteriorated with heavy storms prevailing, so we didn't stop for long. It was then a brief visit into the shops at Calais for liquid essentials of course, wine and diesel (0.62ppl) and on to the ferry port.

Hopefully this article has shown how diverse and interesting a bi-annual visit to Dieppe can be. To use the words of Mr Bethell, may I say *thankyou for listening*.

# Kite Flying Safety Tips

### The NEVERS of Kite Flying

- Fly a kite in wet or stormy weather, try to keep your kite line dry.
- Fly a kite near power lines, transmission towers or aerials.
- Fly a kite with wire or anything metallic in the line
- Fly a strong pulling kite without wearing GLOVES.
- Leave odd bits of flying line etc on the flying site.
- Fly a kite at over 200 feet\*.
- \*Kite festivals may have C.A.A. clearance to fly higher.....ASK!

### The Things to AVOID

- Motorways, roads, car parks railway lines or buildings.
- · Airfields and low flying air traffic patterns.
- Members of the public....stunt flyers please take care!
- Those kite eating trees.
- Animals, they can be frightened by kites. Remember...your kites can get really quite lonely up high in the sky, just occasionally, look up and give them a little SMILE.
