



He said he was so impressed with Neil's modifications he thought he should have this "Original Allison Sled", which left Neil with tears in his eyes but feeling very proud. It's sad that Tal died in October of 2014.

Just got back from Barbury, where several club members came out to celebrate Christmas with the "Christmas Pudding Fly," it was cold with not too bad a wind. Those members, who were brave enough to attend the cold conditions, were fed with Christmas pudding, which I brought to life on the griddle with brandy and butter.


The annual beach kite festival, is on the weekend of 11 and 12 july 2015,

A breath of fresh air, or not a nappy in sight.

This year has seen the return of the "Peter Powell" stunt kite. The shape hasn't changed only the materials and the patterns. For those of us flying kites back in the '70s this was the stunt kite that most of us cut our teeth on. Aluminium spars, plastic sail, wooden handles and the trademark 100ft tubular tail. They were easy to fly and fairly robust. I still have mine with the classic bits of sticky tape repairs. Manoeuvres were smooth and simple and even for the uninitiated they rarely looked as if they were falling out of the sky. Back then your arms didn't have to be the same length and any way the lines stretched so you compensated with making your arms move. Another great benefit was that you only had to carry one, what ever the wind the springy bit in the middle of the spreader took care of it, no ultra-light, standard, vented and supervented and certainly nappies were only found on babies.

Moves then were limited to loops and horizontal or vertical passes with none of today's impressive spins and stall tricks. We still had great fun and a popular game was "combat flying" when several of you stood close together and tried to cut each others tails with your kite, the winner being the one who had the longest tail at the end of the session.

It has been good to see Peter's sons, Mark and Paul flying the new version, usually as stacks of three. The one thing I have noticed is that they seem to be much easier to launch. My wife gave me my first PP for Christmas 1977 little knowing what a life-changing gift that would be. My thanks to Peter for all the enjoyment I and countless others have had from these kites and I wish his son's every success with their venture.

Here in the states we have an organization called Ronald McDonald Charities, purely by fate I got connected with them and I attended a summer camp for children with Cancer. The first year I did kite workshops and now a few years later I'm a councilor and activities specialist. Yup, sleep in cabins with the youngsters:>) After my experience with Ronald McDonald kids I searched for other places that provided similar services. I came across an organization called "The Hole In The Wall Gang Camp" This camp was started by Paul Newman before he died. His vision was to have many camps to provide a fun place for kids to go where they can forget about their troubles and raise a little hell. The great thing is there's no cell phones allowed and no parents. We have the children for a week of all kinds of fun things, fishing, swimming ,boating, archery, arts and crafts, wood working pottery, horseback riding and a raft of other exciting activities, and of course kite making and flying. The

children who attend the Newman Camps have a variety of illnesses, cancer, hiv, sickle cell, major organ transplants, immune diseases, to name a few. Today there are over 25 camps world wide, including Ireland and also in the UK. I have an open invitation to visit these camps but finances prevent that. This year I visited 5 camps and spent 6 weeks on the road. Besides camps I visit children's hospitals and do kite making right in the hospitals. No, we can't fly in the hospital (HA!) but the children have something to look forward to when they go home. My gosh words can't describe the warm feeling you get when you see the smiles on their faces and you've made a difference in their lives.

Rattles from an old reel

By the time you get this it will be well past the shortest day and soon the days will become a bit lighter. You should be kite making.....but....

But to the present...it is a few days before that welcome Winter Solstice and I have been pondering what I actually achieved last year. If you really are kite making I will be quick...a few kite books and a couple of kite adventures. If you are not, then read on.

My kite-life is split between hunting down old kite books and related kite history stuff and going off for the odd kite adventure. This year I had planned to return to Vietnam with my Aeolian friend Uli Wahl when we would again explore the flute kites and try to find the lost villages where handmade paper is made. This was going to be expensive so the books budget suffered.

That lasted until mid-January. At that point Andrea Casalboni popped up from Ravenna to say he was culling some stuff from his historic kite library and was I interested in his copies of the "Revue du Cerf Volant"? Ouch! The pre-Great-War Revues are like gold dust so, of course, I realigned the budgets and started negotiating (complete banking collapse more likely). And then, as so often happens, there was a pincer movement on the fast depleting resources when the remaining photographs of the kite archive of the Kite and Model Aeroplane Association surfaced. Actually it was a subliminal Good Thing since the Revue turned out to be the corner piece of the KMAA archive. Sometime previously I had bought copies of La Revue Aerienne of the same vintage and these and the Revue du Cerf Volant are bound in exactly the same way. The grey card endpapers in these Revues are the same as the card that is used for the 30 or so kite photos that I had acquired of the same vintage. Wow!! After many years of wondering what happened to the KMAA papers, they have come home to roost in my bookcase! Anyway, the revue and the accompanying chance to buy a bound volume of "Le Cerf Volant" pretty well finished off my travel budget.

The big kite-flying season in Vietnam occurs mid April and is determined by the elusive Vietnam solar/lunar calendar. Time ticked on and increasingly things looked gloomy for Vietnam. My plan was to get a flight to Japan which would stage through Hanoi allowing me to get to two countries for the price of one. "Go and talk to the Vietnam Kite Heritage people". We wrote in English and Google Vietnamese; deGoogling from the Google Vietnamese to English gave a hint to our gobbledegook as nothing emerged from Hanoi. But Japan? So then I tried a China/ Weifang to Japan route. That was hijacked by Andreas Agren who was masterminding a festival in Beijing and another in Wuhan...but how about Hamamatsu? Ah, there was a problem in Hamamatsu....they were overwhelmed by

the forthcoming visit by Andreas and Edo Borghetti. Scuppered again!

Rethink and this time it worked. I have Ron Moulton's kite archive and in it are some stunning photos from the giant kite festival at Yokaichi. Accompanying this is a large miniature giant Yokaichi kite auspicious to the Royal Wedding. That, coupled with my love of the abu-dako, allowed me to formulate a plan. There was Plan A, Plan B and Plan C.

Plan G saw me arrive in Tokyo Narita Airport, take the local bus and emerge into the bright sunshine of Nihombashi. Nihombashi is pretty much central Tokyo and very modern. I found a tardis and hit level 3 on the magic keyboard. The tardis disgorged me through the kite curtain into ancient Japan. This is Mr Modegi's famous Tokyo Kite Museum and contains Masami Fukuoka who not only looks after the kites, but also makes kite magic. They have kites there...lots of them. Lots of fantastic paper and bamboo kites. And books!

A couple of days later I got onto a train and, having tunnelled through the mountains, emerged at Takaoka where I was met by Ohye Makato. We went to find out about Japanese washi...the handmade paper. That night was spent in an ancient thatched papermaking cottage somewhere in the mountains with umpteen tatami mats and the open fire gently staining the bamboo roof timbers. Ohye-san did his best to translate my book from Nagoya...the one written in 1780 with the abu-dako woodblock plates and where the abu bones are made from smoke-stained bamboo taken from the roofs of ancient cottages.

I met Mr Nakamura at the Daimon Kite Festival. He is the Chairman of the Abudako Group. We were talking when a little whirlwind came upon us. A wayward abu was swept upwards and ascended a significant distance before landing back more or less where it had started. We carried on talking. Mr Nakamura was a little surprised to be shown a new-to-him abu in the old book of Nagoya. It turned out to be my trump card. The festival itself was fantastic, chaotic and hugely fun. Then I went to Nagoya on the train.

Nagoya was complicated since it was important to make the right impression. I had met Masaaki Sato before but this time we met in his house/workshop. It was full of abu! We went to the river, across the famous bridge (in my book with the Nagoya Shogun's retainers and the kite). The abu group was there to welcome me and show me how to fly the abu. Fortunately I can fly fighters so, when they gave me the impossible to fly little round one, it didn't crash. Phew! They go for £300 and upwards! Something must have worked since the next day they opened up the city museum to show me the really ancient abu which are used as models for today's kites. My translator just happened to be the last descendent of the Shogun! Then they made me a member of the group and, now wearing the approved Happi jacket, I was able to buy my abu. Buy? They were showered on me!



Then I went to Omihachiman which is a short train ride from Yokaichi. Making a photo book of the Japan Kite Association visit to England at the time of the Royal Wedding was a stroke of genius! There is a giant kite museum in Yokaich. Giant, as in huge. Some of the giant kites shown there are huge too. The festival is held on the banks of the river close to the massive Lake Biwa. Once again it was a huge, exciting and noisy festival of paper and bamboo. The big kite had a Shinto blessing. They gave me a photographer's pass so I could nearly get myself killed by the 750kg kite. And Sassa gave me another beautiful abu. The next day I was visiting a man who made the most exquisite miniature kites. Then, before I left, there was the business of kite packing and taking the gift of the 3 kg Yokaichi 3 volume kite history to the post office for onwards delivery to Blighty.

One day I went to Kyoto and met the Last Samurai in an old bookshop. Full samurai regalia too. Mr LS told me that he could whip out his samurai sword and dice apples when they were thrown at him. I wish I had had one to try! He was well into his 80s. Then I went back to Tokyo via Mount Fuji (at 250 kph as the trains go like bullets) to the kite museum and to Kanda. Kanda? Old books. I found a huge pile of woodblock kite prints but they were all £750 a pop! Then I remembered buying the Revue du Cerf Volant! I spent my last few yen on washi...kozo and gampi. Oh, and in the restaurant where the Chinese staff found it very funny that I could not speak Japanese but could get by in Mandarin.

Back to Blighty.... What then? Basingstoke and Gittesen. And then Portsmouth where I occupied a tent along with a few old kites. Original Cody stuff, the triplet of hunting kites from Pitlochrie circa 1860s together with the Bussey's and Darts hunting kites. Various military kites...Wheelwrights and the Brookite submarine wireless kite that can be erected in a confined space. An original tetrahedral cell from Mr Bell....oh, it goes on and on. The only kite I flew was the indoor one on my Arduino controlled device that incorporates an infra-red proximity sensor/speed controller for health and safety reasons. So, given that I did not fly, I was somewhat perplexed to be given the Kiteflier of the Festival trophy just before it started to rain. Was that a hint?







Banana Loaf

After a while with out a recipe, here is a fine one for munching on the kite field with a cup of tea or a glass of beer, a truly versatile snack!

This came from my Grandma and is one of the small number of cakes I can reliably make. Its normally comes into play when the bananas have gone a bit on the black over ripe side and often I double the mix and do 2 at once as its a no fuss chuck it in type of bake. Just watch the cooking time, your oven may be more modern and hotter than mine.

Ingredients
100g soft margarine
100g soft brown sugar
2 Eggs
200g Self Rasing flour
1 level teaspoon of mixed spice
1 table spoon of golden syrup
2 large ripe bananas (over ripe is fine)
100g of sultanas

Method

Grease and line a large loaf tin. Mix togheter flour and spice into large bowl, add remaining ingredients and beat together well until throughly blended. Turn mixture into prepared tin and bake in pre heated oven 350F 180C, gas mark 4 for about 1 hour, then reduce temperature slightly and bake for another 20 minutes. A skewer inserted into the centre of the cake should come out clean if baking is complete. Allow to cool in tin.

Chairmans Report

This has not been the easiest of years; a very wet winter has affected not only kite flyers but also many people in this country. Then there has been the world wide financial problems and as you will hear from the treasurer's report WHKF have had plenty of their own. Then there have been the world wide health scares and sadly this year there are some notable empty spaces in out sky. Just before Christmas there was the news of the tragic death of Kelvin Woods who was known to many of us and he had taught one of our workshops. Then early in the New Year we lost Ron Dell who, trading as Kiteablity had supplied many of us with materials and had been a keen supporter of this club. Later in the same month our long term club member Pat McCarthy passed away. Today we are grateful to his family for many of the prizes in the raffle. If this was not enough, barely a month later we lost Charlie Sottich. How many times over the years have we heard the cry of "Thank you Charlie" as another one of his miniature kites has been won at one of our raffles? Finally Bryn Baggley, who we knew from many festivals lost his battle with cancer

Let's see if we can move to happier times and mention some of the successes of the past twelve months, sadly the Christmas Pudding Fly was called off thanks to the weather but we hope to try again this year on the $27^{\rm th}$

December as usual. In March we had a great workshop lead by Jan van Leeuwen making the five sided, twisted box kite when all attendees completed at least one kite and those who had booked an extra kit were near completion of the second. These have been seen at many places throughout the year notably with a laser display inside from Roy Martin and used for some great aerial shots by Donald Capewell. At the end of the month we cleaned out the store and sorted and identified all the kites there. Thanks to all those who came and helped.

Those of us who didn't go to Dieppe had a spectacular day at the September Barbury meeting and I think it was the best display we have ever had there in 25 years I have been with The Club.

Our last event of the year was the Fun Fly and whilst every one enjoyed a very relaxed weekend there was very little wind and only a few hard working flyers managed to get anything high enough to stay aloft.

In one of my rare articles to the magazine I did have a bit of a rant about litter particularly at Barbury Castle, it doesn't only make the place look horrible but can be dangerous to live stock and children. Even if it is not dropped by club members, as they are known to fly there, they will be blamed. Don't do anything to injure yourself, like picking up broken glass with bare hands but if every one picked up just a few bits and dropped them in a bin the country side would be a nicer place.

As always during my few words I would ask you all to do what you can to encourage new and younger members to join our hobby and persuade the next generation that out doors is not all bad and exercise is not just for the fingers on a keyboard. As we all know there is a lot of enjoyment and relaxation to be had from the hobby even if you are not being pulled along at great speed or risking life and limb jumping through the air. Help them to understand that what they learn at school can often be applied to kites and make it fun.

Two years ago I foolishly said I was prepared to continue as Chairman for 3 years if required. I would be delighted if some one else was prepared to take over this year as I have had a few more health problems and had to miss some meetings. What ever happens I shall not re-stand next year so please think about it and step forward.

Finally I must give my thanks to Neil for starting this Club his support through out the year and for printing the magazine, to Janet for keeping our financial records, Dave for his endless organisation and problem sorting, Don for keeping the supply of kite kits for events and orders that help to fill the coffers, Kevin for the great food, Andrew for editing the magazine and all the rest of the committee for their help. I must also mention Helen who audits our books and is often seen in the kitchen helping Kevin. And last but not least to all of you club members who put up with us lot year after year.

Hon Secretary's Report

Where do I start, the first shock on this insurance problem was last year when Zurich stopped issuing personal insurance, thankfully Gerry was able to help us with the BKFA being able to still get [virtually] the same policy as ours, due to the BKFA being our governing body. Then we had the scare, would Zurich carry on with the club insurance? So when the renewal time came I called them to be told that they would do it but they would be looking at it for the future. I had a conversation with them telling them that our membership had dropped to half of what it was the previous year. A few weeks later we got confirmation that they would re-insure us. What surprised me was that the premium was the same as the vear before when we had many more members, so I called them, to be told that the drop in membership didn't affect the cost of the policy. I protested that it had in previous years, but it didn't cut any ice with them, so we had no choice but to pay up. At the next committee meeting I informed the committee, we were now in a bit of a crisis, with only 65 members and an insurance bill of £600. We needed to find a way of cutting costs, so we came up with the plan of ceasing the club insurance and putting all members in the personal plan through the BKFA, Arthur put this out through the website and in the next magazine and we were going to announce these changes at this meeting, then a few weeks ago in a chance conversation with Helen, where I had to hand over the booking form for next years workshop, on this form I had to fill in details of the CLUB insurance. I then explained to Helen our plans for putting all members in the personal plan. She explained that that really wouldn't cover us for hiring the the School facilities, she also pointed out that all people attending would have to be a club member and be insured by us. She then told me that we could be at risk in the future because our sport attracts families and if say just the father was a member and they came to an organised club event and one of his children picked up a kite and hit someone with it the club could be liable on the duty of care basis. So at the next Committee meeting I informed those present with the latest stage we were at with the insurance, the outcome was to carry on with the club insurance, we decided to increase membership by £1 to help with the club costs. I also told those present that between the committee meeting and the AGM either me or Janet would contact Zurich, it was still bugging me that we were still paying the same premium for 65 members as we were where for 145. Janet made the first contact with Zurich, (she works for them). The outcome was that they offered a mid-term discount of £238, the guy Janet spoke to, told Janet to get me to call them, I did this only to be told that the original guy had been moved to a different department, so I had to explain it all again to this new person, we had nothing

in writing from the first person Janet had spoken to. Luckily she concurred with original contact, the outcome is that the sum of £238 is to be to the club.

ACCOUNTANTS REPORT

INCOME

SUBSCRIPTIONS ETC.

The majority of the club income appears here, Festival Sales and Bank Interest being the exceptions. There has been a very slight decrease in club income compared to last year.

FUN FLY AND BANK INTEREST

This year's Fun Fly was, again, very successful. Bank interest reduced; however, the amount received is immaterial.

EXPENDITURE

The surplus from this year's Fun Fly increased, primarily because of the auction. Regular interrogation of the prices and overheads is essential as reliance on the auction is too risky.

General overheads have fallen this year due to some capitalisation of assets. Depreciation has increased due to the capitalisation mentioned above. All other expenditure lines are comparable to the previous year.

SUMMARY

There is a slightly reduced deficit this year and the introduction of accruals and prepayments in the previous year allowed for all actual in-year commitments to be included, enabling an actual picture to be established.

WHITE HORSE KITE FLYERS CODE OF PRACTICE

Always fly safely.

Always be considerate to others using the same area be it noise or physical intrusion into their space.

Always fly legally taking in to account all national, local and CAA restrictions and bylaws.

Never fly at a height of more than 60m above ground level, in the UK unless a CAA clearance is in force (as at kite festivals). If you don't know what the clearance is ASK!

Never fly a kite in wet or stormy weather. Always try and keep your line dry.

Never fly a kite near power lines, transmission towers or aerials.

Never fly near Motorways, roads, car parks or railways.

Never fly near airfields.

Never fly a kite with anything metallic in the line.

When tethering a kite ensure that the ground anchor is suitable (see BKFA report 6 June 06).

When flying large kites always use a brake line.

Always wear good quality gloves when flying large powerful kites.

Always give priority to domestic animals particularly if they are showing signs of distress.

Always clear up after yourself, especially lines, tails and bits of plastic that could trap, choke or injure domestic or wild animals. If you see dangerous rubbish left by others clear it up or report it.

Never fly near those kite-eating trees.

NOTE: The use of traction kiting at Barbury Castle is forbidden by law.

Finally remember.....your kites can get really quite lonely up high in the sky; just occasionally, look up and give them a SMILE. It will make you feel better too.
