

Kite power to take flight in Scotland next year

Kite Power Solutions plans to open UK's first kite power plant and predicts the technology could global ease energy costs

Giant kites could supply green energy without the need for taxpayer-funded subsidies within years, according to one of the firms developing the technology.

Kite Power Solutions expects to open the UK's first kite power plant in March 2017 at the Ministry of Defence's West Freugh site in Stranraer, Scotland.

It hopes to roll out the technology onshore and at sea, building systems with the capacity to produce "hundreds of megawatts" of power within the decade. The company believes the technology, developed by a handful of firms around the world, could slash the cost of wind energy supplied by conventional turbines. And it predicted that kite power would cost so little that developing countries would be able to use it to wean themselves off polluting diesel generators and other carbon-heavy energy sources.

The technology involves rigging two giant kites, each up to 70 square metres, to either side of a turbine. The first kite rises with the wind, up to a height of 450 metres, moving in a figure-of-eight pattern. The movement pulls a rope that turns a turbine, generating power.

As one kite descends, the other rises in tandem, meaning that electricity can be generated almost constantly.

A spokesman for Kite Power Solutions said the technology could halve the cost of offshore wind energy, dispensing with the need for governments to subsidise wind in an effort to reduce carbon emissions.

David Ainsworth said offshore wind energy was predicted to cost about 10 euro cents (9p) per kWh by 2022, meaning governments would be forced to pay the difference between that and the wholesale cost of energy, currently about 5.5 cents per kWh.

BVG Associates energy consultancy estimates that kite power could cost just five cents per kWh.

Ainsworth said the technology was easy to install and maintain, meaning it could be deployed in deep water, on floating structures far from shore. "If we do that, it opens up a global deep-water offshore wind market," he said.

The technology could curb rising CO2 emissions in the developing world, where the need to save money forces people to resort to polluting technologies such as diesel, Ainsworth said.

The company has tested the technology on a small scale in Essex and will move its headquarters to Glasgow in readiness for next year's launch. It has won planning permission for a 500kW demonstration system but plans to build a 3MW power station after that and is identifying other sites to develop.

A 3MW system would be comparable in power to smaller wind turbines but can produce up to 20% more energy, the company claims. It will also be less than 20% of the weight of a conventional horizontal axis wind turbine, which is made partly out of steel. The kite can fly higher than the tip of a wind turbine, reaching heights where wind tends to be stronger and more consistent.

The UK's green energy trade body, RenewableUK, welcomed the technology but warned it was not a silver bullet. The deputy chief executive, Maf Smith, said: "This is an ambitious project to harness wind power at extraordinary heights and it shows the level of innovation within the renewables industry.

"Kite power is at an early stage of development and it will be interesting to see how the technology progresses. We will need a wide range of energy sources in the future to meet our needs in a sustainable way."

Microsoft billionaire Bill Gates has said there is a 10% chance kite power could be the "magic solution" for global renewable energy needs.

Kite Power Solutions has received funding from the former Department of Energy and Climate Change, the Energy Entrepreneurs Fund and private backers. Its largest shareholders are Kite Power Solution's chief executive, Bill Hampton, and chief operating officer, John Hardy.

FUN FLY ITALIAN CHICKEN CASSEROLE

Well here we go guys and gals the nights are colder now and a lot darker so I thought I'd let you have the recipe for the Italian Chicken Casserole we served at the fun fly

For 4 people –

- Dice up 2 large chicken breasts to about 1cm dice (no need to be to accurate)
- Sauté the chicken in a pan with a little oil until browned on all sides
- Thinly slice/dice (depending on what you prefer) 1 large carrot and 1 white onion
- Dice 1 sweet bell pepper and 2 large baking potatoes
- Open 1 can of mixed beans in brine (not in tomato sauce) drain and rinse, open 1 can of chopped plum tomatoes
- In a casserole pan sauté the onion with a little oil until tender add the carrot and pepper cook for 3 minutes until just starting to soften
- Add the chicken to the mixture
- Add the potato, beans and tomatoes stir to mix well when it starts to bubble add a good couple of splashes of red wine (something you actually want to drink it makes all the difference) and about a pint of good chicken stock
- Turn the heat right down and simmer for about 30 minutes until the chicken is cooked. At this point I tend to add French beans/mange tout/broad beans or peas if you like (but it's up to you)
- For the dumplings Mix 4oz self-raising flour, salt and pepper with 2oz suet add water until the mixture comes together DO NOT MIX TOGETHER TOO MUCH OR THE DUMPLINGS WILL BE LIKE ROCK
- Form a ball of dumpling mix and make a hole with your finger into it add a small piece of mozzarella cheese and cover over
- When all dumplings are made add to the casserole and cook covered for 15-20 minutes (they should puff up once cooked)

- Serve in bowls with a chunk of crusty bread to mop up the juices So there you go a nice warming casserole to keep you going though the cold months ahead



Not just for Halloween.

I had liked the Skeleton kites sold, under license, by Premier kites since I first saw an obscure video of one last year.

I knew who manufactured them but, despite the many favours I had done them in the past, they were not willing to give one up to me - even at a price!

I had corresponded many times with Premier Kites too but, historically, they have only ever contacted me when they wanted something - their customer service ethic doesn't appear to me to stretch to replying to emails - however, in other correspondence, a number of people have told me that I'm not lonely!

And then I saw <u>kiteworld.co.uk</u> had got a stock of them in and I was swiftly on the phone to order up three ...

One 21ft long Black, a 21ft white pirate and the only 10ft pirate they had in stock.

It's OK - I had obtained pre-permission from Marilyn to buy them - well, for two of them anyway.

They arrived within two days - Happy Bunny!

How do they fly?

I will say that didn't really expect these kites to fly as well as they do.

The head is the part that flies (the kite) - and the body is the tail held out by two connecting rods across the shoulder and two rods, under bowed tension, as the hips.

The heads are big and flat and don't look at all as if they will fly but once the 'bones' are unfurled and clipped and velcro'd on, everything makes extreme sense.

There have just got to be some other designs yet to be imagined using this same simple form - or perhaps there are?

We both think that they are quite amazing in the way that they fly and have no hesitation in recommending them.

Of course I didn't expect a flying line in the bag from Premier Kites but any light line will do as they launch easily and slowly with minimal pull before gently dancing, just like - well I suppose just a skeleton in the sky really?

Over confidence

A word of warning though - Don't have your first assembly session out on the kite field.

There are a fair number of different sized rods to find a place for and a ribbon to tie them in place at the centre.

Some of the rods are supposed to go through sleeves that you don't notice until you've assembled past that stage and the odd shape will have you working harder than Lord Sugar's face cream in even the slightest breeze if you're not able to display positivity about what goes where!

Flatly refusing to look at the instructions (Marilyn is getting as bad as me now), we showed great teamwork in assembling the first head in our lounge.

Once we had finally sussed it, the second and third kites took no time at all.

The 'body' section just unrolls and is easy.

However, we still have not yet taken up the challenge of setting it up on the field and the kites are put in the car last, on top of the rest of the gear. If I can finish up with words of wisdom to reflect on for all those teaching or learning to fly multi-line or to those with kite making projects stuck halfway.

"You have only failed if you give up - until then it is just experience".

A trip to Waitrose this morning to pick up a few more ingredients, more onions and peppers to chop. I had a few people watching me today which was interesting as they were watching the way I chop ingredients (I hope they learned something) lol

Coffee in hand as we got the kitchen fired up, a huge bag of pasta to cook and the sauce to make, pastas going well nice and al-dente. As well as helping to organise the Southampton kite festivals and winter leagues, Alec provided the sound system for the Bristol Kite festivals in partnership with ProSound Systems of Southampton and travelled around under his own steam with STACK providing sound and even commentary for the events.

Hundreds attended the funeral and, fittingly, Alec was carried from the church to the music of "I did it my way" played live by his favourite steel band.

The wake was held at a nearby golf club in the heart of the New Forest and, watched by all those present, I flew our 16m Trilobite up to about 150 feet, much to the alarm of some of the club members out on the course.

White Horse Kite Flyers Code of Practice

Always fly safely

Always be considerate to others using the same area be it noise or physical intrusion into their space.

Always fly legally taking in to account all National, Local and CAA restrictions. Never fly at a height of more than 60m above ground level, in the UK unless a CAA clearance is in force. (as at festivals) IF YOU DON'T KNOW.......ASK.

Never fly a kite in wet or stormy weather. Always try and keep you line dry.

Never fly near power lines, transmission towers or aerials.

Never fly near airfields.

Never fly a kite with anything metallic in the line.

Always when tethering a kite ensure that the ground anchor is suitable (see BKFA report 6 June 06).

Always use a brake line when flying large kites.

Always wear good quality gloves when flying large powerful kites.

Always give priority to domestic animals particularly if they are showing signs of distress.

Always clear up after yourself, especially lines, tails and bits of plastic that could trap, choke or injure domestic animals.

Never fly near kite-eating trees.

Note the use of traction kiting at Barbury Castle is forbidden by law.

Finally remember....your kites can get really quite lonely up high in the sky; just occasionally, look up and give them a SMILE. It will make you feel better too.
