

For those of you who were enquiring about one of the salads at the AGM, I have managed to get hold of the recipe from our friends who did the buffet. Here it is below.

Ingredients	For the dressing		
1.2kg sweet potato, peeled and	4 tbsp yogurt		
cut into biggish chunks	½ bunch of coriander		
2 tbsp madras curry powder	Juice of one lemon and one lime half		
1 tbsp of cumin powder	Thumb size peeled ginger		
1 tbsp olive oil	Salt		
	Crushed mixed nuts		

Method

Heat oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6. Spread on a baking parchment-lined baking sheet. Roast for 30 - 35 mins until tender and golden. Cool at room temperature.

When just about cool whisk together all the dressing ingredients with a little more seasoning and gently toss through the potato chunks – use your hands to avoid breaking them up. Add more salt, pepper, touch of honey, lemon juice, etc., make any necessary tweaks, and serve. Decorate with crushed mixed nuts, pomegranate, coriander leaves.

Hon Treasurers Report

MEMBERSHIP

Income again this year as there was a small charge for membership WORKSHOP

Much as we tried to control the overheads, we still managed to make a small loss on the workshop. Since then, a lot of work has been done to achieve a breakeven point and this is the intention from the next year.

FUN FLY

This year, the committee introduced a charge again for fun fly food The expenditure items here are primarily site and kitchen overheads, such as Fridge, Cooker, Marquee and Toilet Hire. There was a manageable and expected loss on the event.

INSURANCE

Insurance included both the club insurance and personal insurance, which is recharged to members. There is a loss this year on the personal insurance due to the fact that the BKFA needed the information in advance of the premium becoming due so all existing personal insurance members were renewed and then some didn't pay their premium to continue. The process for this will change next year as the premium will be paid each May and that will form the basis of the following year's insurance premium to members

General Finance Discussion

It was explained that 3 years ago an agreement was reached, with members, to reduce the balance in the bank, over a period of 3 years. Members opened a discussion on how wrong it would be to let the workshop slip sway because it couldn't breakeven on any year and said that they were committed to the continuation of it. They asked, in light of the cash holding of the club, if there would be any way to get a guaranteed subsidy to ensure continuance, if there was a shortfall. After a lengthy discussion, it was agreed that the club would subsidise up to £200 per workshop.

Proposed by David T; Seconded by Alan H; Unanimous

A lengthy discussion also took place surrounding a desire by the club to reduce the reserves to c£5k within 3 years. The committee had taken a decision that, in order to achieve this, the very successful raffles and auctions held annually will still take place but the funds would be donated to a charity.

From the discussion surrounding charity donations, there was a further discussion about promoting kite flying and if we should ring fence some funds for this purpose. It was agreed that £1000 would be ring-fenced for this. Proposed Don S; Seconded Paul C; Unanimous

White Horse Kite Flyers Code of Practice

Always fly safely

Always be considerate to others using the same area be it noise or physical intrusion into their space.

Always fly legally taking in to account all National, Local and CAA restrictions.

Never fly at a height of more than 60m above ground level, in the UK unless a CAA clearance is in force. (as at festivals) IF YOU DON'T KNOW.......ASK.

Never fly a kite in wet or stormy weather. Always try and keep you line dry.

Never fly near power lines, transmission towers or aerials.

Never fly near airfields.

Never fly a kite with anything metallic in the line.

Always when tethering a kite ensure that the ground anchor is suitable (see BKFA report 6 June 06).

Always use a brake line when flying large kites.

Always wear good quality gloves when flying large powerful kites.

Always give priority to domestic animals particularly if they are showing signs of distress.

Always clear up after yourself, especially lines, tails and bits of plastic that could trap, choke or injure domestic animals.

Never fly near kite-eating trees.

Note the use of traction kiting at Barbury Castle is forbidden by law.

Finally remember....your kites can get really quite lonely up high in the sky; just occasionally, look up and give them a SMILE. It will make you feel better too.
