Bamboo harvested from Camp Zama to be used to construct traditional giant kites

CAMP ZAMA, Japan (Nov. 24, 2021) – A local organization dedicated to preserving the Japanese tradition of kite-making was at Camp Zama Nov. 19 to harvest bamboo with help from the commander of U.S. Army Garrison Japan.

Members of the Sagami Giant Kite Preservation Association, Kassaka District, visit the installation annually to cut and gather bamboo found near the Camp Zama Golf Course's driving range. The bamboo is dried and later used to construct a giant kite that is flown during a festival held in May.

Toshiaki Yaita, president of the SGKPA, Kassaka District, said the bamboo he and his team harvest from Camp Zama is used to make the giant kite's framework. They harvested about 280 stalks this year, Yaita said.

Along with bamboo, giant kites are constructed of handmade Japanese paper and are built to a size of about 48 feet tall. Each kite weighs more

than 2,000 pounds and requires a team of 80 to 100 people controlling a 650-foot-long rope to fly it.

"It's becoming harder and harder annually to find decent bamboo elsewhere, so we are very grateful that the [USAG Japan] commander supports us, and that we are able to use bamboo from local areas like Camp Zama to continue our local traditional festival," Yaita said.

The next festival, scheduled for May 2022, will be the first time it will be held since 2019, as it was cancelled the previous two years due to COVID-19. Yaita is hopeful the festival will go on as planned.

"It's very important to prepare for [the festival] as if it will be held for the sake of perpetuating our traditional culture," Yaita said.

The USAG Japan commander attends the Giant Kite Festival, held at the nearby Sagami River, as a bilateral engagement. The festival in May 2022 is scheduled to be the first for Col. Christopher L. Tomlinson to attend since he took command in August.

This was Tomlinson's first experience with cutting bamboo, and he said he enjoyed the opportunity to host Sagamihara City officials and members of the SGKPA, Kassaka District, as they prepare for the festival. The best aspect of the annual partnership, Tomlinson said, is that it gives him an opportunity to engage with the city and to share in the culture and traditions of which Camp Zama is a part.

"I think it's pretty awesome to be able to utilize our facility and installation to be a critical part of what is a tradition for the community," Tomlinson said. "Any opportunity that we can come to share with our community, it's a priority."

Koichi Uchida, the association's executive director, said he and his team are very grateful to have the support and partnership of the USAG Japan commander for the kite festival each year.

"Camp Zama and our community are right next to each other, so we feel very special and proud to be able to use Camp Zama's bamboo to make our local traditional kites," Uchida said. "Sagamihara City's giant kite festival always starts with the harvesting of bamboo from Camp Zama."

Robinson's Ramble

Yet again, not much action in my kite flying, we recently had a Committee meeting and made the decision that all things being in our favour. We will be holding the Fun-fly in September.

Janet made the decision to relinquish her position of The Club's Treasurer, a position she has held in excess of 30 years, she asked the Committee if she could remain on the committee, a wish that they granted.

Kevin Griffiths has taken over the reigns, the advantages of this is that Kevin has Computer skills, something that Janet didn't have, this will make Helen's job much easier, she will be able to 'Crunch' the figures with ease.

I hope I am not repeating myself, I thought I had written in the last issue about the state of the field at Barbury, it was so overgrown that it was almost impossible to walk through it. I decided to write to the local Authority to complain about it. It took about two months for them to reply. I was quite surprised by their reply. They were aware of how long we had been using Barbury and apologised for the state of the field, they said that they had been unable to get a farmer to put some sheep on to the field and it did say in the letter that they were still trying to find someone! Well surprisingly, last month when we were there a farmer arrived with a trailer full of sheep. I had a chat with him, he said that the sheep would bring down the state of the field, but he said don't hold your breath, it will take a long time before the sheep will clear it. We were up at Barbury recently, and the sheep had been reducing the (jungle) but it looks like we will have to be patient.

In the recent Committee meeting it was decided that we will be holding a Workshop. We haven't decided who too conduct it but we will let you know as soon as we have any details.

Sponge cake with fresh fruits

(As supplied at the AGM by Marzena)

Ingredients:

1 ½ cups of fine wheat flour

½ cups of oil (e.g., sunflower)

4 eggs

34 cup of sugar

2 tablespoons of vanilla sugar

1 1/2 tea spoons of baking powder

Pinch of salt

Additionally:


1 ½ cups of fresh fruits of your choice (e.g., blackberries, blueberries, strawberries, raspberries, rhubarb, sliced apple; or any combination of these)

A method of preparing:

- 1. Preheat your oven at 180 C.
- 2. Beat white eggs with a pinch of salt. Then add sugar and vanilla sugar, then add yokes and oil and flour (sieved with baking powder). Mix slowly everything together until all ingredients are combined.
- 3. On a greased baking tray, lined with baking paper, pour the dough on top of it with the rinsed and dried fruits.
- 4. Bake the dough for about 50-60+ minutes at 180 C degrees (fan oven), until a "BBQ stick come dry".
- 5 . Before serving, decorate with sieved icing sugar. Could serve warm with ice creams or custard.

Ronsrodel

This amazing little sled kite is by Ron Arztmann. It was designed to be stable in many wind conditions, have no spars or tail, be made from virtually any material and be small enough to be carried in your pocket. It is made from a single piece of material folded across the centre line. The size can be varied by changing the value of (a). On a paper version the join can be made with sticky tape. I made one of ripstop using (a=60mm) and added an allowance for sewn seam. It flies superbly. For full details go to :- https://bit.ly/3yHnpdP

White Horse Kite Flyers Code of Practice

Always fly safely

Always be considerate to others using the same area be it noise or physical intrusion into their space.

Always fly legally taking in to account all National, Local and CAA restrictions.

Never fly at a height of more than 60m above ground level, in the UK unless a CAA clearance is in force. (as at festivals) IF YOU DON'T KNOW.......ASK.

Never fly a kite in wet or stormy weather. Always try and keep you line dry.

Never fly near power lines, transmission towers or aerials.

Never fly near airfields.

Never fly a kite with anything metallic in the line.

Always when tethering a kite ensure that the ground anchor is suitable (see BKFA report 6 June 06).

Always use a brake line when flying large kites.

Always wear good quality gloves when flying large powerful kites.

Always give priority to domestic animals particularly if they are showing signs of distress.

Always clear up after yourself, especially lines, tails and bits of plastic that could trap, choke or injure domestic animals.

Never fly near kite-eating trees.

Note the use of traction kiting at Barbury Castle is forbidden by law.

Finally remember....your kites can get really quite lonely up high in the sky; just occasionally, look up and give them a SMILE. It will make you feel better too.
